Good Humor Most

Valuable Thing in Life.

In watching the baseball match on Saturday, everyone was struck with the persistent good humor of the visitors and the gentlemanly way in which they played the game. There was plenty of banter, but it was of the kind which leaves no sting. Only once at the evening game did Daly, the pitcher, show signs of impatience, and then he talked to himself for a minute or so instead of talking to the ball. His recovery was so quick, however, that it served only to add to the general feeling of good humor.

The match was in strong contrast with some of the local games, especially football, in which a few of the players have persistently made a point of being as bitter as possible with opponents. It was pleasant for the players and for the fans.

It is such a mistake for anyone, whether playing a game of ball or taking part in the ordinary game of life, to take himself too seriously and to make himself disagreeable. Life is too short for that sort of thing: Anyone who does it should certainly be banned from all games and be given short shrift in the more serious contests of daily life.

VANCOUVER, June 19 .- Col. Collishaw in an interview here says that Deniffine's retreat in Russia was due to spoliation work of the peasants, who followed the army. The Canadian pilots, he says, did wonderful work. It was the biggest kind of war and the hardships were unheard of. There were no hangars, although the thermometer showed 24 degrees below zero. They were forced to take food from the peasants. Water had to be thawed and the oil heated before flying.
