Hinton Affidavit

Proves Interesting.

The affidavit of W. P. Hinton in connection with the car shortage here given out to Colonel Peck by the Minister of Trade and Commerce at Ottawa, as published in the Daily News yesterday, makes interesting reading. It does not set forth much that is new, but it does give the official viewpoint and it shows that ... Mr. Hinton has been on the job all the time, so far as the interests of Prince Rupert are concerned. He recommended to the receiver that 100 cars were needed but that fifty would to some extent relieve the situation. When he was notified that thirty had been ordered he protested that thirty would be wholly inadequate.

And yet we have had people in this city who had nothing but vilification for the general manager of the road and blamed him for everything that was wrong. It is clear now that the only reason we did not get the improvements was because the Government seemed intent on starving out this place. We have not been getting a fair deal, in this respect.

We must give credit to the Government for having let the contract for the new dock here, but in the matter of fish cars they have been clearly negligent. In view of the situation, another effort should be made at once, possibly by a mass meeting or through the Board of Trade and City Council to have this car shortage drawn to the attention of the Dominion Government Continual bombardment is necessary if we are to arouse attention. It is no good to sit back and wait. Possibly the Unionist Association can be prevailed on to back the local request.
