**Have You Registered?  
 Everyone Should Ask.**  
 "Have you registered?" That is a question everyone should  
 ask his neighbor. Perhaps it is more necessary to ask it of the  
 business and professional men than of the working men. The  
 former seem too busy whereas the latter are becoming alive to  
 their privileges. Get your name on the voters' list whoever you  
 are. This is a country where majorities control, and it is the  
 privilege of every man to take part in the government of the  
 country.  
 The men who do not vote are usually the worst kickers.  
 They object to everything anyone does. Then they forget to  
 register. The time to register is today. It may be too late to-  
 morrow for you may be too busy or social duties may make you  
 forget it. There is nothing to pay in order to get on the list.  
 You may not feel you want a vote now, but something may come  
 up which will rouse you to a sense of your duty and then you  
 will need your vote. Get on the list.

**Correspondents Must  
 Keep to Rules.**  
 There are still some people who do not understand that the  
 Daily News does not publish anonymous letters. Yesterday there  
 came through the mail a letter signed "Longshoreman's Wife"  
 but with no other signature. That is not enough. There is no  
 necessity of having the writer's name published, but it must  
 accompany the letter.  
 Another rule is that letters must not be libellous or un-  
 parliamentary in the language used. When a person accuses  
 another of telling "lies" it is unparliamentary if not libellous.  
 Letters must adhere to the ordinary courtesies of debate. The  
 News, while anxious to give every opportunity to discuss public  
 questions, must have correspondents keep to the ordinary regu-  
 lations of every well-regulated newspaper office.

**Hinton Affidavit  
 Proves Interesting.**  
 The affidavit of W. P. Hinton in connection with the car  
 shortage here given out to Colonel Peck by the Minister of Trade  
 and Commerce at Ottawa, as published in the Daily News yester-  
 day, makes interesting reading. It does not set forth much that  
 is new, but it does give the official viewpoint and it shows that  
 Mr. Hinton has been on the job all the time, so far as the interests  
 of Prince Rupert are concerned. He recommended to the receiver  
 that 100 cars were needed but that fifty would to some extent  
 relieve the situation. When he was notified that thirty had been  
 ordered he protested that thirty would be wholly inadequate.  
 And yet we have had people in this city who had nothing  
 but vilification for the general manager of the road and blamed  
 him for everything that was wrong. It is clear now that the only  
 reason we did not get the improvements was because the Govern-  
 ment seemed intent on starving out this place. We have not been  
 getting a fair deal, in this respect.

We must give credit to the Government for having let the  
 contract for the new dock here, but in the matter of fish cars  
 they have been clearly negligent. In view of the situation, another  
 effort should be made at once, possibly by a mass meeting or  
 through the Board of Trade and City Council to have this car  
 shortage drawn to the attention of the Dominion Government.  
 Continual bombardment is necessary if we are to arouse attention.  
 It is no good to sit back and wait. Possibly the Unionist Associa-  
 tion can be prevailed on to back the local request.

The table given is for Port  
 Simpson but the time for Prince  
 Rupert varies only a few minutes  
 on some days and on others is  
 the same. The range of the tide  
 may be computed as 5 per cent  
 greater at Prince Rupert than at  
 Port Simpson both at springs and  
 neaps. Therefore the rise in the  
 Prince Rupert harbor is slightly  
 greater than Port Simpson.  
 The height is in feet and tenths  
 of feet above the average level of  
 lower low water.

**MUCH EVIDENCE  
 IN DUFF CASE**

Afternoon Session of Assize Court Was Significant—Constable Tells Story.

In the afternoon session yesterday evidence from the deposition of Charles Miller was allowed to be read but only such portions as had direct reference to Duff. Parts of the old evidence which came out included a description of Duff's appearance at the bath house and his conversation with Leahy in the other room. In his evidence Miller had stated that he had had no conversation with Duff as to the amount of liquor and the price. When a number of cases were placed on the launch Duff asked, "How about the money?" Miller said, "Come aboard and I'll give you the amount. He came aboard with the understanding that he was to be paid.

Jack Hoskins was the next witness to take the stand and he described how the cases had come to his house and they had remained there for four or five days. When the car came to take the cases away to the Cold Storage he did not count the number of cases. The crown prosecutor asked "Was all the liquor taken out that night?"

Witness, "Yes."  
 "Did Duff and yourself remove it all?"  
 "No, Matt and I took the last load down."

When witness was asked if he had examined the cases he said that he had had no particular occasion to do so. He had not noticed any names on them and hadn't paid any attention to the labels. He said that he had no conversation with the accused.

"Duff called you up on the telephone?"  
 "Yes, he asked if I could store some cases for a friend in my house. Matt Videck and Dicky Leahy brought the cases out."

**The Arrest.**

Constable Albert H. Bailey told of the arrest of Constable Simon V. Duff on the launch Narbethong at the Cold Storage on the morning of February 13. When the boat with the party came up to the wharf, Miller stepped ashore and had a conversation with Duff and then both walked away. Witness said that he could not hear what they were saying on account of the noise from the engine. Miller came back aboard the boat where he received the cases which were then turned over to the captain and thence stored below the deck. After a number of the cases had come aboard, Duff came on and went down into the cabin with Miller. The men on the Narbethong were concealed in various parts about the ship. Miller had just taken a roll of money from his pocket when the door catch which was holding the two police officers gave away and they were precipitated into the cabin. Duff was then arrested and 24 double cases, 4 single cases and one broken case were taken to the police station from the boat following the seizure. Those on exhibit in the court were from the same. The balance were under lock and key.

**Pronounced It "Scotch."**

A bottle was opened with the prisoner supplying the cork screw. Chief Minty performed the operation in front of the jury. The bottle was handed to Constable Bailey. He placed it on the ledge of the witness box and was asked to tell the jury if it was whiskey. He remarked that he was no connoisseur of whiskey and asked for a glass.

Mr. Eisher: "You will notice that you are a favored witness."  
 The verdict of the witness was that it was "Scotch."

When cross-examined by Stuart Henderson there was much difficulty in getting dates and times of arrest for Leahy and Duff so Constable Bailey was allowed to get the police records. Counsel for the accused wished to find out how much whiskey had come into Prince Rupert previous to the shipment received by Lipssett and Sweet. Mr. Bailey could not enlighten him as he (witness) had been in England from December 23 to February 10.

Constable Bailey told that Charlie Miller was hired by Lipssett to buy the whiskey. He had no idea how much money there was in the big roll of bills.
