OTTAWA, June 28 .- Rumors are busy here in regard to a general reorganization of the Union Government. It is said that Premier Borden is likely to retire as well as several of his colleagues. H. H. Stevens of Vancouver and Colonel C. W. Peck, V. C., of Prince Rupert are mentioned as cabinet possibilities.

The general opinion seems to be that if the Government is to carry on until after the census there will have to be a reorganization. There is another opinion that the present Government cannot stand the process of reorganization but that it will fall to pieces directly.
