Dominion Day
Great Event.

Dominion Day is a day to be remembered by every Canadian. It is the birthday of the Dominion of Canada, when the confederation of the provinces became effective. By the provisions of the British North America Act passed in 1867 the four provinces of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia became one Dominion under the British flag with provision for the entry of other provinces. All have now taken advantage of the offer except Newfoundland, which still remains a crown colony.

Canada Nearly
Independent Republic.

Canada approaches very near to being an independent republic; but in sentiment she is intensely British. The only official connection with Great Britain is the resident governor-general who takes the place of the King here by officiating at important national or social functions and by signing the bills that are passed by Parliament. This signature is necessary before bills become law. There is also a right of appeal from the Canadian courts to the judicial committee of the British Privy Council, but this is falling into disuse and there has been from time to time considerable agitation for the repeal of that provision.

For all purposes of government the Prime Minister of Canada is the head of the administration and he holds his office subject to the will of the House of Commons. As the House of Commons is elected directly by the people, the government is purely democratic and representative. It approaches very close to the ideal, in form, but like all governments it is as good as the people it represents.

Government
Reflects People.

We believe that the Dominion of Canada has as good a form of government as any other country and better than a good many of the republics. It is, however, still far from perfect. It is just as good as the people who elect the representatives to Parliament. The way to improve the Government is to improve the general status of the people, morally, physically and socially.

The people of Canada are a virile people, but we are continually absorbing people from other countries and we have to see to it that these new arrivals are educated in Canadian ideals. This is a great opportunity for such organizations as the Sons of Canada. As a country we have a lot to learn and a great work to do.

Canada's Future
Lies with the People.

The future of Canada lies with the people of Canada. Our country will be what we make it. It is a good thing to hold a celebration and extol the virtues of our nation, but also it is a good thing now and then to be introspective and to see wherein we sometimes fail so that we may better guide our future conduct. We can make of this a great and powerful nation if we have high ideals and live up to them. On the other hand we can drag the name of our country in the mud and make her to stink in the nostrils of the other nations of the world. Which shall we do? Our future is in our own hands.

"ALMOST A HUSBAND"
AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

The story of "Almost a Husband," adapted from Opie Read's widely read novel "Old Ebenezer," is as different from the ordinary run of screen stories as is Will Rogers' personality from that of every other motion picture star. It is a story of small-town life, a masterly blend of humor, drama and pathos. Above all, it is a warmly human story in which human characters do human things. Novelty and surprises abound in "Almost a Husband."

The story tells of Sam Lyman, a homely but shrewd and kindly teacher in Old Ebenezer. At the annual town social the prettiest girl in town and the daughter of the wealthy banker plays in a game of forfeits and is directed to marry the first man who comes through the door. Sam inadvertently opens the door and is forced to go through the mock marriage ceremony with the girl. After the ceremony it is discovered that the law requiring a marriage license has been repealed and the young clergyman who performed the service has already been ordained. Thus the prettiest girl in town and the homeliest man find themselves legally married.

From this point on, the plot unravels in a highly interesting manner and develops a number of dramatic complications that are well tinged with romantic sentiment and spontaneous humor.
