## SETTLERS ON FINDLAY RIVER WASHING GOLD

Bringing more than half a ton of choice raw furs for the Hudson's Bay Company, Gus Montan, an old-timer in this district, arrived on Monday last from Fort Grahame. Travelling by canoe over the Giscombe-Summit Lake route, Gus made the trip out in 16 days. He reports considerable travel over the all-water route to Peace River and many prospective settlers are now on the way in to spy out the land.

Mr. Montan states that probably fifty settlers are washing gold on the bars of the Findlay River and its tributaries, and all are making good wages despite the high cost of living in that region. Flour is worth \$24 per hundred, and all other necessities are proportionately high priced.

Settlers have planted small areas in vegetables, grain, etc., and these show wonderful growth and promise big yields. The potato crop looks especially promising and no frost since April has been evident. Potatoes were planted early in May and are well advanced.

Mr. Montan is highly pleased with the Findlay country and expects to start on his return trip in a few days.—Prince George Herald.

## In the Letter Box

Prince Rupert, July 3, 1915.  
Editor Daily News:—I notice by action of City Council last Monday night, that my former letter helped produce the desired result—a reduction of civic expenditures. I am sure the majority of ratepayers will agree with me that the acts of some of the council members in this matter are worth recording; the acts of others are worth remembering until after next election.

Now while we are thankful for small favors, we still have right to ask for larger ones. Many more reductions could be made without impairing the efficiency of the city staff. I think the city has no need for an assessor for the remainder of this year and part of next year, and there appears no reason why the city clerk's duties should not be performed by Mr. Johnson in addition to his duties as treasurer. Ald. Montgomery's attitude in this respect is well taken. And the salary of the city solicitor could also be saved. Competent legal service could be obtained for one quarter the amount paid Mr. Peters.

Next let me suggest that the duties of the purchasing agent could be performed by the chairman of each department. At present all orders given by the purchasing agent must pass some department. Each superintendent could place order direct and eliminate much red tape.

In the police department it seems no more than three men are necessary in a town of the size of ours; the chief to do day duties, and two men at night.

In the fire department, would ask our council why the ratepayers of this town need provide apartment houses for employees. We have two families living in the fire hall, and it is stated that they receive free coal, free light, free water and free rent. Since many men paying taxes have empty houses to rent, would suggest that in this respect the ratepayers are not fairly treated.

We now own the electric light and telephone departments, and were led to believe that on completion of present hydro electric plant, electricity could be more cheaply generated. Instead we find as many or more men employed by the city in production of electric energy than formerly. The city provides a gasoline launch and maintains same for employees at the lake, and hires a man or two to do chores and wait upon them. In this connection would like detailed information concerning charges to the city for street lighting.

In conclusion would suggest that if essential for a city engineer to be employed, such engineer should have charge of the water, light and telephone, the whole of such service not to cost more than two hundred dollars per month.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

#### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
