FIERCE FIGHTING ALONG WESTERN FRONT

BRITISH CAPTURE TRENCHES—ARRAS BOMBARDED—GHURKAS DRIVE OUT TURKS

PROMINENT MANUFACTURERS GREATLY IMPRESSED WITH CITY

THREE MEMBERS OF CANADIAN MANUFACTURERS ASSOCIATION VISIT DRYDOCK AND COLD STORAGE PLANT AND ARE SATISFIED THAT PRINCE RUPERT'S FUTURE IS ASSURED

In response to an invitation from the Board of Trade, J. H. Sherrard, president of the Canadian Manufacturers Association, W. J. Mooney, and J. Leonard Apedaile, arrived from Vancouver yesterday morning. Mr. Sherrard is president of the Alaska Feather and Down Co., Ltd.; Mr. Mooney is the head of the Mooney Biscuit Co., Ltd.; and Mr. Apedaile is Canadian partner of Touche & Company of London.

On arrival the visitors were met by the mayor, and a deputation from the Board of Trade, and spent the forenoon in conference with the Board. In the afternoon, accompanied by the mayor, J. H. Pillsbury, Geo. B. Hull, G. R. Naden, George Tite, Geo. W. Nickerson and E. Grangras, on the Leila R, they left the government wharf for the drydock.

Under the direction of J. H. Pillsbury, the various departments were visited, including the palatial offices recently opened. The visitors showed a keen interest in everything they saw, and were greatly impressed with the magnitude of the structure, and the great things it foretold of the future.

Mr. Mooney said he had been particularly struck with the feeling of optimism prevalent among the business men of Prince Rupert. He had noticed in other places, especially where the business men had neglected business and had given themselves up to real estate gambling, a tendency to bemoan the hard times, without making much of an effort to dig down and help make things better, but in this city there seemed to be a whole-hearted desire to make the best of things

and to prepare for the future. Since seeing such a structure as the drydock, he could realize the cause for this optimism. Prince Rupert's future is assured.

After thanking Mr. Pillsbury for his kindness, the visitors proceeded to the plant of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., where they were met by Mr. Johnson and conducted on a tour of inspection through the stores, packing rooms, cold storage and ice making departments, etc. Here again, the visitors were impressed with the capacity of the plant and amount of business being done. Mr. Sherrard remarked that he was glad to observe that, in every way, Prince Rupert is preparing for the future. Like Mr. Mooney, he had noticed the hearty spirit of optimism which prevails in every line of business in Prince Rupert. As a director of the Export Association of Canada which is being formed to take advantage of the changed commercial conditions resulting from the war, Mr. Sherrard is particularly interested in the Pacific coast ports as shipping points for Canadian goods, and he had great hopes for Prince Rupert in this respect, particularly in regard to trade with Siberia and Russia.

All three gentlemen, on leaving for the south this morning, expressed themselves as delighted with their visit, and were unstinted in their admiration of the scenery and location of the city. They believe that the drydock will soon be a hive of industry and that Prince Rupert has every reason to look ahead cheerfully.

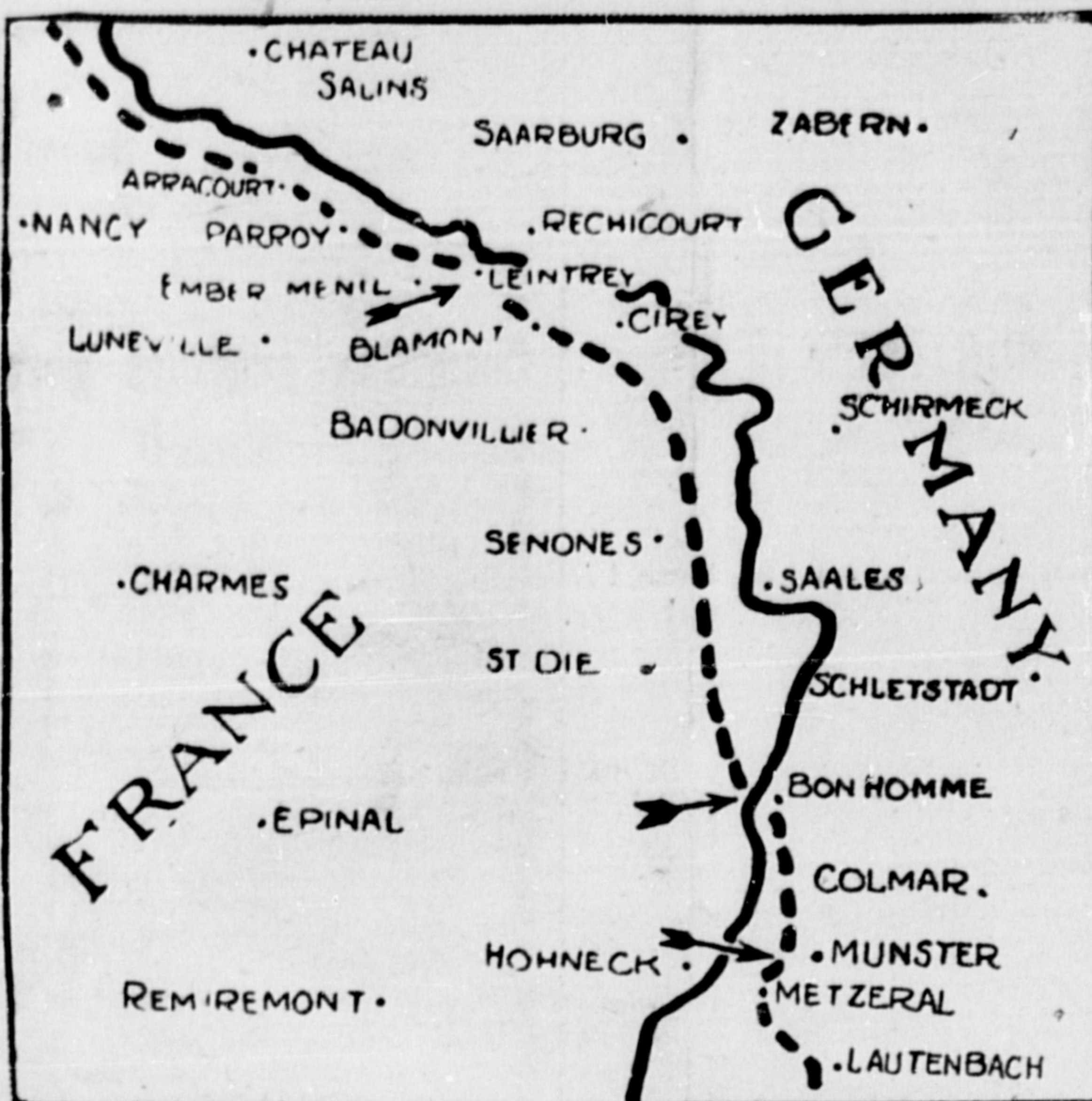
The program concludes with a screaming comedy entitled "Almost a Hero."

FIERCE FIGHTING ON WESTERN FRONT AND THE DARDANELLES

THE BRITISH CAPTURE GERMAN TRENCHES—ARRAS BEING BOMBARDED—GHURKAS DRIVE THE TURKS FROM THEIR TRENCHES—GENERAL WOUNDED—RUSSIA APOLOGISES

London, July 6.—There has been fierce fighting on the western front as a result of the British advance in Flanders.

The British have captured German trenches southwest of Pilliken on the east bank of the Yser Canal.

Arras is again undergoing a bombardment, and there is incessant fighting in the Argonne district.

Russia Apologises.

Russia has apologised to Sweden for the violation of her neutrality. The occasion was the recent fighting off Gothland, when a Russian ship pursued a German minelayer toward the Swedish coast and fired shells within the three-mile limit. A fog which prevailed at the time caused the miscalculation.
