RUSSIANS INFLICT SEVERE CHECK ON ENEMY

HOLT'S DESPERATE SCHEMES—LINERS TO BE BLOWN UP AT SEA—DRIVE ON CALAIS

MORGAN'S ASSAILANT HAD DESPERATE SCHEMES ON HAND

SUPPOSED PLOT TO BLOW UP LINERS AT SEA—HOLT INTENDED TO DESTROY NEW YORK BUILDINGS—LINERS ARRIVED AT HAVRE WITH UNEXPLODED BOMBS ON BOARD

Glen Cove, N. Y., July 7.—Following the suicide of Frank Holt in his cell last night, a letter to his wife was discovered, announcing that the Cunarder Saxonia, or the liner Philadelphia, or both, would be destroyed by explosion today.

The navy sent a warning to both vessels, which are at sea, of the danger of an internal explosion, and advising them also to steer toward each other as a mutual convoy in case of an explosion. The Philadelphia replies all well, but there is no reply from the Saxonia. The police discovered 124 sticks of dynamite

in Holt's trunk. He intended to dynamite New York buildings. Sixty sticks of dynamite are still unaccounted for.

Holt Identified.

New York, July 7.—Frank Holt has been positively identified by former friends as Erich Muentler, the former Harvard instructor, who disappeared in 1906 after being indicted for the murder of his wife, Leona, by gas poisoning.

Bombs on Liners.

The authorities admit that three ships, which sailed from New York to Havre, France, in May, arrived with unexploded bombs on board.

PROTEST AGAINST LICENSING METHOD

The following letter from M. M. Stephens Co., Ltd., was read at the city council on Monday night: The Mayor and Council, City of Prince Rupert, B. C.

Dear Sirs:—Herewith find bill for \$17.90, overcharge on account of licence issued to George A. Tessier, June 30th, 1915. Briefly the facts are that Mr. Tessier went out of business on June 21, having run from January 15 without having paid any license fee until June when he paid \$18.00 on account. The business formerly conducted by Mr. Tessier was taken over by Mr. Ben. F. Hunt on June 28th, but the city treasurer insisted on the Tessier license being paid up and completed, although Tessier was already out of business, or that a new license should be charged of \$40.00, although there remained only seventeen or eighteen days until the new license would have to be taken out. Mr. Tessier paid \$18.00 for the privilege of conducting the same business that we paid \$22.00 for the privilege of permitting Mr. Hunt to

FIFTY-SIX PRINCE RUPERT MEN JOIN THIRD CONTINGENT

MORE THAN HALF ARE SCOTCH—MEN FROM THE INTERIOR WILL ARRIVE TONIGHT—WILL PARADE FROM THE TRAIN TO RECREATION PARK—BASEBALL GAME AND FAREWELL

Farewell will be taken of Prince Rupert's third contingent tonight. Lieut. Van Der Byl, with his complement of men from the interior will arrive on the train at 6:45. They will be met by the men from here, headed by the city band, pipers and the boy's bugle band and a parade will be made to Recreation Park.

Arrangements have been made for a baseball game between the Civil Servants and the Chaffeurs, the proceeds of which will be distributed amongst the boys. Each one will be presented with a ticket calling for his proportionate amount of the fund.

The contingent leaves tomorrow morning on the Prince Rupert for Vancouver, en route for Vernon, where they will undergo some months of training.

Up to this morning the following Prince Rupert men had enrolled for the third contingent for active service. There are 33 Scotchmen, 6 Canadians, 2 Australians, 1 Irishman and 1 Welshman.

Judging by the above figures, the fighting blood of the Scots has been aroused, and the Scotch boys in Prince Rupert are living up to the centuries old reputation of this hardy northern race. The following are the names:

RUSSIANS INFLICT SEVERE CHECK ON AUSTRO - GERMANS

ENEMY HELD UP AT KRASNIK IN POLAND—ITALY KEEPING UP HEAVY BOMBARDMENT—RUMORS OF A GREAT GERMAN DRIVE TOWARDS CALAIS—THE ALLIES HOLD PILIKEN TRENCHES

London, July 7.—The Russians have inflicted a serious check on the Austro-German forces at Krasnik, in Poland, where the invaders threaten Warsaw.
