PROTEST AGAINST LICENSING METHOD

conduct until June 15th; eighteen days. The city treasurer allowed Mr. Tessier to run nearly five months without a license but refused to allow Mr. Hunt the same privilege. We have had to make good the difference between the pro-rata proportion of the license which Mr. Hunt was entitled to pay and what we had to pay, and hence lost \$17.90, or would have lost our tenant through the neglect of the city treasurer to perform the duty of collecting the license which he is paid a good salary to do. We who are paying taxes and incidentally paying, with other tax payers, the salary of the treasurer to perform the duties of the collector find that these matters are not being attended to and that we are asked to make good the losses to the city through that official's neglect of duty.

It may come as a matter of surprise that this official is permitting businesses to run in this city without licenses for months at a time and sending policemen to collect licenses from men who have not been in business for a week.

We maintain that it is most unfair to the ratepayers and to those who are paying their trade licenses when due that such a state of affairs should be allowed to exist, and that there should be permitted the interpretation of the license bylaw by the collector in different ways to suit the cases of different individuals.

Firms have gone out of business during the last six months without having paid their license, although the bylaw states that they shall have a license before they may transact business.

We also believe that when the collector is permitted to compel those, not in any way interested in a business for which he has neglected the collection of the license fee to make good the loss to the city that too much power is being delegated to that official and that a great injury is being done the citizens, not only through loss of license fees, but through unfair competition in business by those without a license against those who are license holders.

The city treasurer's report on the matter stated that the rule of collecting licenses in advance had never been lived up to, and went on to show how little had been lost by this procedure. The treasurer pointed out that he had placed the collection of licenses on a much better basis than formerly; that it was impossible for him to go out collecting himself, but that the police department was handling the collections carefully. He contended that the action taken in the Tessier case was the only possible one.

The city solicitor upheld the action of the treasurer and the finance committee recommended that the report be sustained.

Alr. Edge, seconded by Ald. Dybhavn, moved that this be endorsed. Ald. Casey, seconded by Ald. Montgomery, moved that it go to a special committee. Ald. Nicol, seconded by Ald. Kerr, moved that it be referred to the license committee. This carried.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.


