London, July 17.—The South Wales coal strike is still unsettled. The miners executive failed to reach an agreement at a meeting in London today.

The executive will meet again at Cardiff on Monday. A special meeting of the cabinet has been called.

Rioting has broken out at the Pembry collieries. Soldiers who were sent to guard the mines, have arrested seven of the rioters.

Loyal Women.

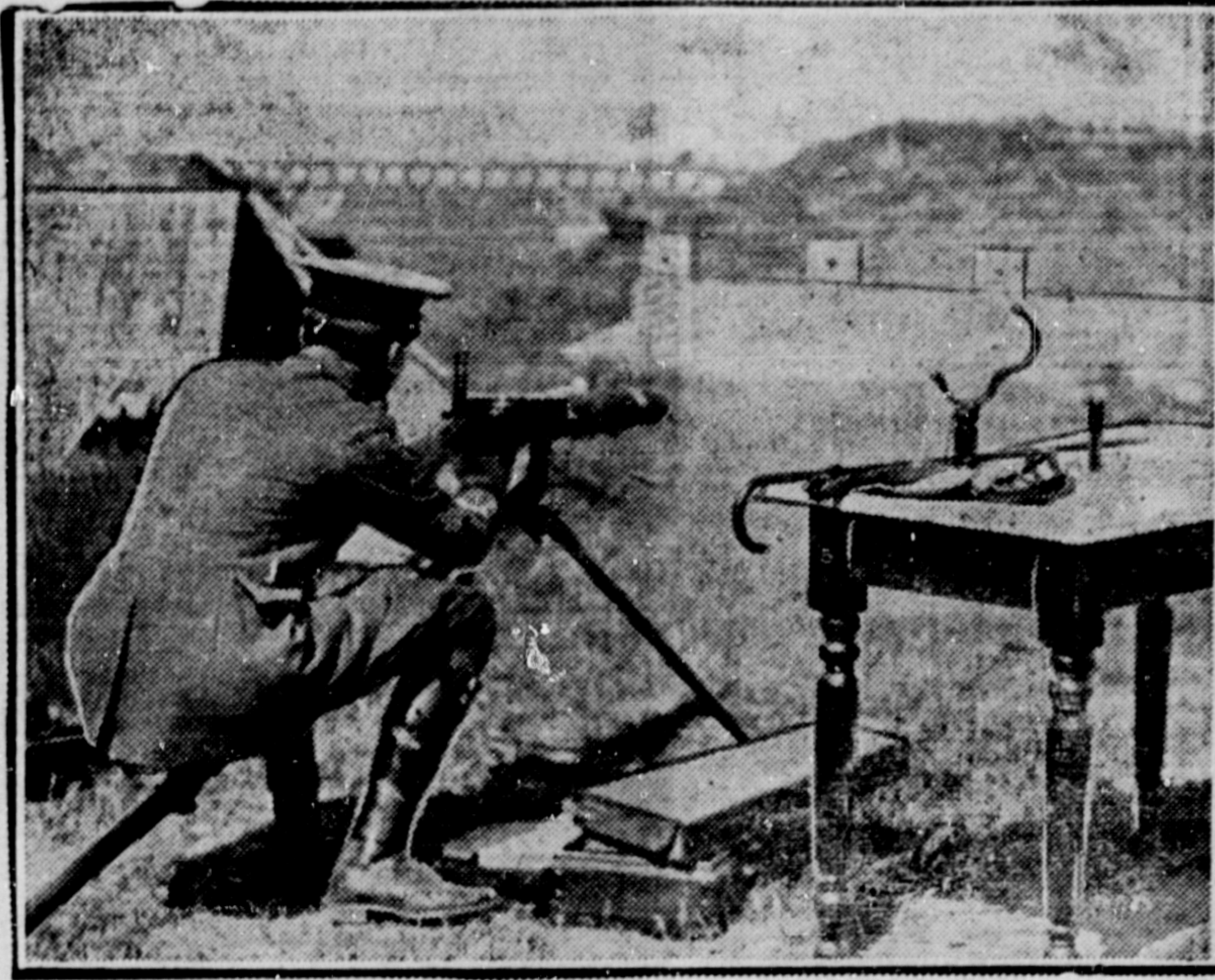
A procession of 500,000 women paraded the streets of the city

AUSTRIAN RETREAT ACROSS DNEISTER TURNED TO ROUT

DEADLY RUSSIAN ARTILLERY FIRE--LINER ORDUNA ESCAPES FROM SUBMARINE--COURT OF ENQUIRY INTO THE LUSITANIA DISASTER FINDS THAT VESSEL WAS UNARMED

Geneva, July 17.—Deadly Russian artillery fire and fierce bayonet charges have converted the Austrian retreat across the Dneister into a rout.

Liner Escapes.

New York, July 17.—A submarine attempted to torpedo the liner Orduna, which reached here today. Failing in the attempt, it fired six shells, none of which took effect. Ultimately the submarine was outdistanced in the chase.

Lusitania Enquiry.

London, July 17.—The court of

enquiry into the Lusitania disaster finds that no blame attaches to Captain Turner or to the Cunard Line. It finds that the torpedoing was done not merely with the intention of sinking the ship, but also to destroy the lives of her passengers.

The court also finds that the behavior of the crew was above blame; that the ship was unarmed, and that her ammunition cargo consisted only of 5,000 cases of cartridges, from which there was no explosion.

KAISER SAYS WAR IS TO END IN OCTOBER

London, July 17.—The German Emperor, according to the Times, in a speech to a deputation of bankers who had insisted on an interview in order to point out to the Emperor the financial difficulties of the situation and the grave risk attending the pursuance of the campaign through another winter, stated that the war would end in October.

The bankers are alleged to have declared that even if the war was fought to an end immediately and an indemnity obtained, Germany's position would be difficult, but that if the war was prolonged the German Empire would become utterly bankrupt. It was in reply to those representations, according to the Times, that the Emperor is understood to have declared that the war would end in October.

GERMAN FINANCE MINISTERS CONFER

Berlin, July 16.—In a conference in Berlin of the finance ministers of the several German states approved the presentation of the German imperial treasury regarding Germany's financial situation.

The war loan and taxation and other measures to be submitted at the meeting of the Reichstag, including gains from the manufacture of war material, were also discussed.

The ministers present agreed that Germany's financial situation was most favorable and that the nation was resolved to hold out until a victorious peace was assured.

GERMANS IN NEW YORK SENDING PAMPHLETS

London, July 16.—Many members of the House of Commons and other public men in Great Britain have been the recipients recently of numerous pamphlets from the press of New York weekly publication which is devoted to the German interests. Quotations from pacifists such as Bernard Shaw, James Ramsay MacDonald and Norman Angell comprise the bulk of the matter.

GERMAN OFFICERS SENT TO CONSTANTINOPLE

Athens, July 16.—Two trainloads of German officers have arrived at Constantinople. These men are to fill gaps caused by casualties at the Dardanelles.
