THE SITUATION

There seems to be a little feeling of despondency over the evacuation of Warsaw. It certainly is not cheering news, and the report that Austrian cavalry has succeeded in cutting the Russian lines of communication with the south does not improve matters. However, the only plan is to keep a stiff upper lip, and take a long view of the situation. This war is not necessarily a matter of weeks, or months. It is something which has got to be pursued relentlessly and determinedly to the bitter end.

The Germans are making a strong fight of it, as was to be expected since they had been preparing for years. Lord Kitchener knew what Europe was up against when he stated that the war would last for at least three years. If the Russian armies can retain a solid front, the German advance need not cause any deep depression. The Russians are as confident as to the ultimate outcome as their French and British Allies are, and all are thoroughly determined that there is to be only one result.

In a war of such dimensions setbacks must be looked for, but they must only serve as incentives to us to make greater sacrifices in the cause of liberty. This is a war in protection of all that is best in the civilisation of the twentieth century. Whether the Germans advance to Moscow or to Paris or to the gateway of London, the barbarianism which they represent must and shall be utterly defeated.

The events of the past few days will lend an added solemnity to the commemoration services to be held throughout the Empire on August fourth. This is no time for a celebration, in any sense of the word.

but it is an eminently fitting occasion for every citizen to make a solemn vow that he is ready to make the last sacrifice in the name of liberty. The adoption of a measure of conscription might be a means of convincing the Allies that we are in deadly earnest, but, to red-blooded sons of Britain, all that should be necessary is that they realize that they are needed. One full-blooded volunteer is worth three half-hearted conscripts, and it should not be necessary for Britain to demand that her sons shall rally to the side of justice and freedom. This momentary German success should prove to be the strongest recruiting agency of the whole momentous year.

ANOTHER GUN

There was such a rush of subscribers to the machine gun fund on Saturday that much more than the amount aimed at could have been collected. The only plan will be to open a fund for a second gun. Probably the end of the month brought along a number of cheques which had been promised, but it is also likely that the news of the German advance in Russia helped matters considerably.

It is quite possible that enough money could be collected by Wednesday night to provide another gun, which, with the Cold Storage contribution would make three guns from the terminal of the Grand Trunk Pacific. Every machine gun subscribed for is equivalent to a draft of several hundred men. Prince Rupert is nobly doing its share in men and guns.

Mr. Garland is a conspicuous example of how a Conservative member of Parliament can survive after being publicly buried by Premier Borden. With Arthur de Witt Foster, M. P., the commission seems to have had less trouble. He is not an old hand like Garland. He is a young beginner and easily frightened. The mere announcement that the commission would visit Nova Scotia and go farther into the purchase of horses was enough to make up his mind. He resigned three weeks ago, thus implementing his interment by Premier Borden last April. One may hazard a guess that nothing more will be done to young Mr. Foster. When he gives up the ghost he gives up all that was expected of him. The moral in Mr. Foster's case seems to be—keep the vouchers.

The commission has also provided a soft spot for T. A. Birkett, of the Keystone Supply Company to fall on. It gave him a chance to restore the plunder and avoid a criminal prosecution, which was done accordingly. Birkett is famous as the man who sold
