McBRIDE DOOMED

The time is drawing near when the McBride government must face the people, and the longer they gaze on the prospect the less inviting does the prospect become. It was a simple matter sliding back into power when things were booming, and when people were making apparently easy money. People have discovered that the good times were more apparent than real, and that the wealth which seemed to be theirs was merely a will o' the wisp affair. When Sir Richard last faced the country, people were suffering from a gambling fever which hindered them from looking an inch below the surface of things. They were ready to accept any fairy tale which told of prosperity, and let it go at that.

Railroad development was the cry, and the people were too busy to count the cost. Everybody was talking and thinking in millions and a few millions more or less was neither here nor there.

Today, the position is reversed; the fantom millions have flickered out, so far as the credit side is concerned, and the only real millions loom large on the debit side of the ledger. The principal and interest guarantee to the much-lauded railroads is the only reality which McBride has to show. The province is loaded down with a weight of debt which cannot be carried on hot air. Compared to British Columbia, Manitoba is well off financially, in spite of the wholesale looting of the treasury. In two years, Manitoba will recover its financial credit, but it will take British Columbia much longer to fill up the gaps made in the financial standing of the province.

Sir Richard still speaks of the resources of this province as if he put them there, and he still draws magnificent pictures of the future. He forgets that the people of this pr...

ince have ceased to gamble in futures; they are too busy with the present and the past. People want to know where the money has gone, and they will have to be told. They are not flirting with millions now, but paying out matter-of-fact dollars of one hundred cents each. They want to know what Matson did with the \$45,000; they want to know the details of the Kitsilano Reserve deal; they want to know why the Dominion Trust was allowed to rob them. These are only a few of the little details which require explaining.

Conservative brains are busy trying to guess the right kind of bait to use, when the fateful day comes along, but they are still more concerned about the right day. They needn't use up any more grey matter over the day; the day is long since past. No balloon platform will be of any use, no matter how many flags they wrap around it. Manitoba had the last word in fancy rigging, but the people saw clear through to the hideous heart of the thing. McBride and his gang are doomed to disaster and ignominious oblivion.

EMPIRE'S VITALITY

For years past, pessimists have drawn woeful pictures of the fall of the British Empire. It was the fashion for a certain class of writers to compare the rise of Britain to that of the Roman Empire, and to wind up with a doleful warning that the great British nation had passed the zenith of its power and was on the downgrade. British youth was depicted as a spineless thing, which had lost all caring for anything but sport and luxury, and the belief was expressed that the nation would crumple up when a national crisis occurred.

How splendidly has the youth of the Empire belied these statements. In the great crisis, the Empire has shown itself to

be a thing of youthful vitality, instead of decrepit age and decadence. Britain's sons have shown that they possess to a marked degree the spirit of their ancestors and are in no way inferior as fighting men to the stalwarts who fought at Waterloo and in the Crimea. Perhaps the most remarkable feature of the present struggle is the magnificent work done by men who had no previous experience of soldiering. Men from behind the counter, from the desk and even from the pulpit, have performed feats which shall rank with anything done in the glorious days of the past.

Instead of being on the downgrade, there is every evidence to show that the British Empire is still on the upgrade in everything that makes for liberty, freedom and justice. From the titanic struggle now being waged the Empire will emerge as a stronger, more complete whole than it ever has been. The ties which bind the various parts together are not the bonds of servitude, but the much more powerful, though less apparent, ties of the love of sons for a dear old mother.

TODAY'S LEADERS ARE ALL OLD MEN

Oldish men still remain on top in this war after a year of hard fighting. The four conspicuous commanders are Joffre, of the French; Von Hindenburg, of the Germans; French, of the British, and the Grand Duke Nicholas, of the Russians. All are well up in the sixties.

That is an unusual circumstance. Caesar was a young man when he invaded Gaul. Alexander was a boy when he made his first conquests. Napoleon became the military meteor on earth before he was 30, and he and Wellington were only 46 when they met at Waterloo for the last fight either ever witnessed.

Washington was but 45 when he wintered at Valley Forge, and he was not yet 50 when Cornwallis surrendered to him his army at Yorktown. Grant was only 43 as he stood at Appomattox. Stonewall Jackson had won a military record for all time before he was killed at 39.

Von Moltke was the exception, as he was 70 when, 45 years ago this summer, he trapped the armies of France in six weeks. But these seem to be the days when age gets the plums.

Didn't our governor just designate as Pennsylvania's three greatest men one 73, another 75 and a third 77?

And yet Elihu Root, at only 70, pretends he is too old to be president!—Philadelphia Ledger.
