FAVORABLE TERMS OFFERED TO BULGARIA

AMERICANS WENT DOWN WITH ARABIC — BERLIN CLAIMS SUCCESS IN RUSSIA

ALLIES OFFER FAVORABLE TERMS FOR BULGARIAN HELP

BULGARIA OFFERED IMMEDIATE OCCUPATION OF SERBIAN MACEDONIA—ASKED TO DECLARE WAR ON TURKS IMMEDIATELY—BERLIN CLAIMS A BIG CAPTURE

Rome, August 20.—The Entente powers have offered Bulgaria the immediate occupation of the portion of Macedonia given her by the Serbo-Bulgarian treaty of 1912. Serbia is to get Kavalia and district. Bulgaria is to renounce all claims on Salonika, Vodina and Uskuba and to declare immediate war on Turkey, aided by the funds of the Allies. General Jecoif succeeds Fitchett as minister of war.

Berlin Report.

Berlin, Aug. 20.—It is claimed that the fortress of Novo Georgievsk has been taken and 20,000 Russians captured.

Riga Defence.

Petrograd, August 20.—An official report received here says that Russian warships protecting the entrance of the Gulf of Riga

have drawn closer in, owing to the great superiority of the enemy's fleet in these waters.

SUBMARINE PURCHASES

Victoria, Aug. 17.—Sir Richard McBride is in receipt of a wire from Sir Charles Davidson, special commissioner appointed by the Dominion government to investigate war contract purchases, which says he probably will visit Victoria on September 1st to take up the matter of the purchase by the government of British Columbia of two submarines from the Seattle Drydock and Construction Company.

ARTHUR NOBLE WILL RETURN TO CITY SOON

Arthur Noble is expected back in Prince Rupert shortly. He has been visiting at his old home in Peterboro, Ont., for the last few days. "Art" was a member of the first contingent from Prince Rupert and will be the first of that sturdy band to return from the field of battle. He has had some stirring experiences, and will bear the marks of the fray at Festubert so long as he lives.

The returned warrior will be given a right royal reception on his arrival in this city. The following is an extract from the Peterboro Examiner of recent date:

"Wearing the scars of war, Private Arthur Noble, son of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Noble, of this city, is visiting his parents for a few days before proceeding west to his home in Prince Rupert. In the charge at Festubert he was hit in several places with shrapnel, losing his right eye, and receiving a gash on one hand. Private Noble was in one of the hottest corners in which the Canadians participated; the charge from the orchard at Festubert as it was referred to in the despatches, and he certainly witnessed thrilling action, but when seen by a reporter, he was as uncommunicative and silent as a censor."

BOARD OF TRADE HEAR FROM E. J. CHAMBERLIN

In reply to a wire sent to E. J. Chamberlin regarding the starting of work at the drydock, the Board of Trade today received the following telegram:—"Engineers have not advised shipbuilding plant completed. Furthermore question of manufacturing munitions of war has been fully considered and found that the machinery is not adapted for work of this kind."

PROSPECTS GOOD FOR BIG EXHIBITION

The board of directors of the Northern B. C. Agricultural Association met in the Board of Trade rooms last night. Everything is well in hand and the prospects are bright for a splendid exhibition. Secretary F. S. Wright reported that interest throughout the district is keen. Settlers along the G. T. P. and on the Islands are preparing to make the fair a big success, both in attendance and in exhibits.

The board met representatives from the baseball clubs and football association. It was decided to hold games as special attractions, charging 25 cents admission to each game. Of the proceeds of the game, the teams will get 75 per cent, provided outside teams are competing. Ketchikan and Hazelton teams are expected, while the Granby football team may also come along.

TWENTY MISSING—TWELVE OF CREW AND EIGHT PASSENGERS LOST—ARABIC TORPEDOED WHILE GOING TO RESCUE OF THE DUNSLY—PRESIDENT WILSON DEFIED

New York, August 20.—Of the twenty missing from the Arabic twelve are of the crew and eight are passengers. Four of the passengers are Americans, including Dr. Edmond Wood, Hamesville.

SCHEME TO IMPROVE SWIMMING FACILITIES

It may not be known to all that there is excellent bathing in what is known as the Salt Lakes just across the bay. It is very possible that during the finer weather one of the local launches will run a ferry across at intervals during the late afternoon and evening so that the citizens who have not launches may avail themselves of the prettiest spots anywhere.
