BRITISH WARSHIPS DESTROY SUBMARINES

ZEEBRUGGE HARBOR DAMAGED—BRITISH AVIATOR SINKS GERMAN SUBMARINE

BRITISH DAMAGE HARBOR AND DESTROY SUBMARINES

AVIATOR SINKS A SUBMARINE—GERMANY IS TRANSFERRING TROOPS FROM EAST TO WEST—FRENCH AVIATORS ACTIVE—WELSH MINERS CEASE WORK—BERLIN CRAWFISHING

London, August 27.—Details of the naval attack on Zeebrugge show that the harbor defences were damaged and several German submarines destroyed.

Flight Commander Bosworth, in an aeroplane, sunk a submarine off Ostend yesterday.

Transferring Troops.
The Germans are transferring troops from the eastern front to the west.

Aviators Active.
Paris, August 27.—French aviators continue their activities on the western front. Numerous attacks are reported.

Miners Dissatisfied.
London, August 27.—To show their dissatisfaction with the government report, 25,000 South Wales miners ceased work today.

Steamer Sunk.
The steamer Palmgrove has

been torpedoed. The crew was saved.

Berlin Crawfishing
Washington, August 27.—Developments with respect to the relations between the United States and Germany have been reduced in intensity. The situation foreshadows a declaration by Berlin on the subject of submarine warfare which will eliminate all source of discord. Baron Von Bernstorff has informed Secretary of State Lansing that the statement issued on Tuesday was intended to imply that submarine commanders would be ordered to attack no merchantman without first giving warning.

Von Bernstorff has also notified Secretary Lansing that Germany will make full satisfaction for the sinking of the Arabic, if it is found that she was sunk without warning.

DECOMPOSED BODY IS FOUND IN SECTION TWO

The badly decomposed body of Louis Knudsen, a Norwegian was found in Block 17, Section 2, near Tate Street this forenoon.

About June 16th Knudsen tried to commit suicide by jumping from a window of the Grand Hotel. At that time his brother promised to take care of him, but it seems that, shortly after being released by the police, he disappeared, and had not been heard of since.

Judging from the condition of the body, he must have been dead for several weeks. Death was due to strangulation, self inflicted.

MERCANTILE MARINE OFFICERS ARE WANTED

PLACER MINING ON QUEEN CHARLOTTE

Placer mining is always a subject that appeals to most men and no subject has been more abused. The word placer gold to the average man leads his thoughts towards bonanza, multimillionaires and all the frills and excitement of Klondykes, and Californias.

Very few can realize that some men are content to work placer ground which gives them only modest, yet steady returns, and are inclined to be sceptical when placer is mentioned in any form except dollars to the pan, etc.

A few miles from Massett there is a sandbar, older than the hills around it, covered with heavy growth of timber, and to all intents and purposes a most unlikely looking place for placer deposits. Yet on this bar has been found deposits of black sand running very fair in gold and platinum values. It has been experimented on by several, mostly though by men who were coarse gold miners, and not familiar with the finer art of saving gold in a flour state. They took out a little, but not enough and gave up the job. A short time ago there arrived at Massett an old time prospector, who had mined the beaches of Oregon and other places, where the black sand carried gold values, which can only be saved by careful handling and knowledge. He investigated, and thought it looked good enough and is taking a chance.

He has gone about it quietly and steadily, has thoroughly prospected his ground, and stripped and laid bare the ground to be worked, and notwithstanding lack of water, always a great drawback to placer mining, has started in on the pay dirt.

He can show you a small face about five feet high and six feet long where he has taken out \$200 in gold and platinum values; he can take you to other places where he is working, and if you are a placer man, a pan or two will show you that while it is an hydraulic rather than a straight old time placer prospect, it carries surprising values.

There is no room for doubt to the experienced eye, he has pitched on likely ground, prospected

GERMAN INVADERS TO ATTACK BREST-LITOVSK-MOSCOW LINE

OLITA FORTRESS IS REPORTED EVACUATED—GERMANY TO MAKE IRON PENNIES—THE AUSTRIANS FAIL TO STOP ITALIAN ADVANCE—TURKS HAVE MASSACRED ARMENIANS

London, August 27.—The Austro-German invaders are now in Russia proper. It is reported that the fortress of Olita on the Nieman has been evacuated. The main object of attack is the railroad between Brest-Litovsk and Moscow.

Italian Front.
Rome, August 27.—An official report says:—"In Val Sugana our troops have extended their ground and occupied points above Trento. As far as positions on Mount Amentera and Mount Saluto, the enemy failed to prevent our advance. In addition, they left a few prisoners in our hands."

OCEAN FALLS PLANT TO START UP AGAIN

The Ocean Falls paper-making plant is expected to be in full swing again before long. Twenty-five men are engaged in overhauling the plant of the Pacific Mills, Limited, the property formerly controlled by the Ocean Falls Limited.

Work will shortly be started on a new mill which the company intend to erect, and, when it is in thorough working order, over 500 men will be employed.
