In this last dastardly act, Berlin has placed Washington at defiance in the most unmistakable manner, and, if the president still contents himself with a cabled notice of surprise and another demand for an explanation, he will prove to the world that he made a grave error when he did not walk out along with William Jennings Bryan.

Berlin is quite willing to go on explaining for the duration of the war. It will not be surprising to learn that the Hesperian was sunk without instructions, and that the submarine which committed the murder can not be found, but that Berlin has given definite instructions that warning must be given to all liners. The farce will be kept up just so long as America cares to use cables instead of guns. The honor of the United States is at stake: all that the American flag stands for has been set at defiance, and Washington must prove to the world that it places safety on a lower plane than honor and freedom.
