### THE KAISER WEPT CROCODILE TEARS

Paris, Sept. 17.—ABassel dispatch summarizes a recently published article by Anton Fendrich, the prominent Baden Socialist, describing a conversation with Emperor William at general headquarters on the western front.

Herr Fendrich was greatly impressed with the emperor's sincere pacifism and also with the sorrow of his disillusionment regarding his royal relatives in England and Russia, who "betrayed him at a moment of danger."

"The emperor," Fendrich said, "related for an hour horrible French atrocities. Carried away by the monstrosity of these proved acts, which leave no hope for decadent France, the emperor wept more than once at the shame of such demoralization of a once noble people, victimized now by a fixed idea."

The emperor said the result of the war would be the "unification and purification of Germany for her historic task of serving as the heart of Europe."

### CAUSE OF RUSSIAN MUNITION SHORTAGE

London, Sept. 17.—Great interest was shown here today in reports printed in a London paper which declared Russian shortage of munitions was caused by the blowing up, months ago, of the great Russian ammunition factory at Okhta, with the loss of some thousands of lives. Not a word of this reported disaster had reached here. It is believed here that the story is at least probable, for the Russian munitions failed suddenly and this could not have been caused by a mere failure to foresee the heavy demand for projectiles and power.

A. B. Smith Retailer.

A. B. SMITH has a dry goods store in a certain Canadian city. He does a good business, but wants to do more. He believes that Advertising in his local newspaper is the way to get more business. So he advertises—every now and then. This is where our friend Smith is wrong—in advertising every now and then. He should advertise regularly—as frequently as his local newspaper is published.

So Smith can do more business, and more business means a larger income for himself, to say nothing of other gains that go hand in hand with the doing of bigger business.
