

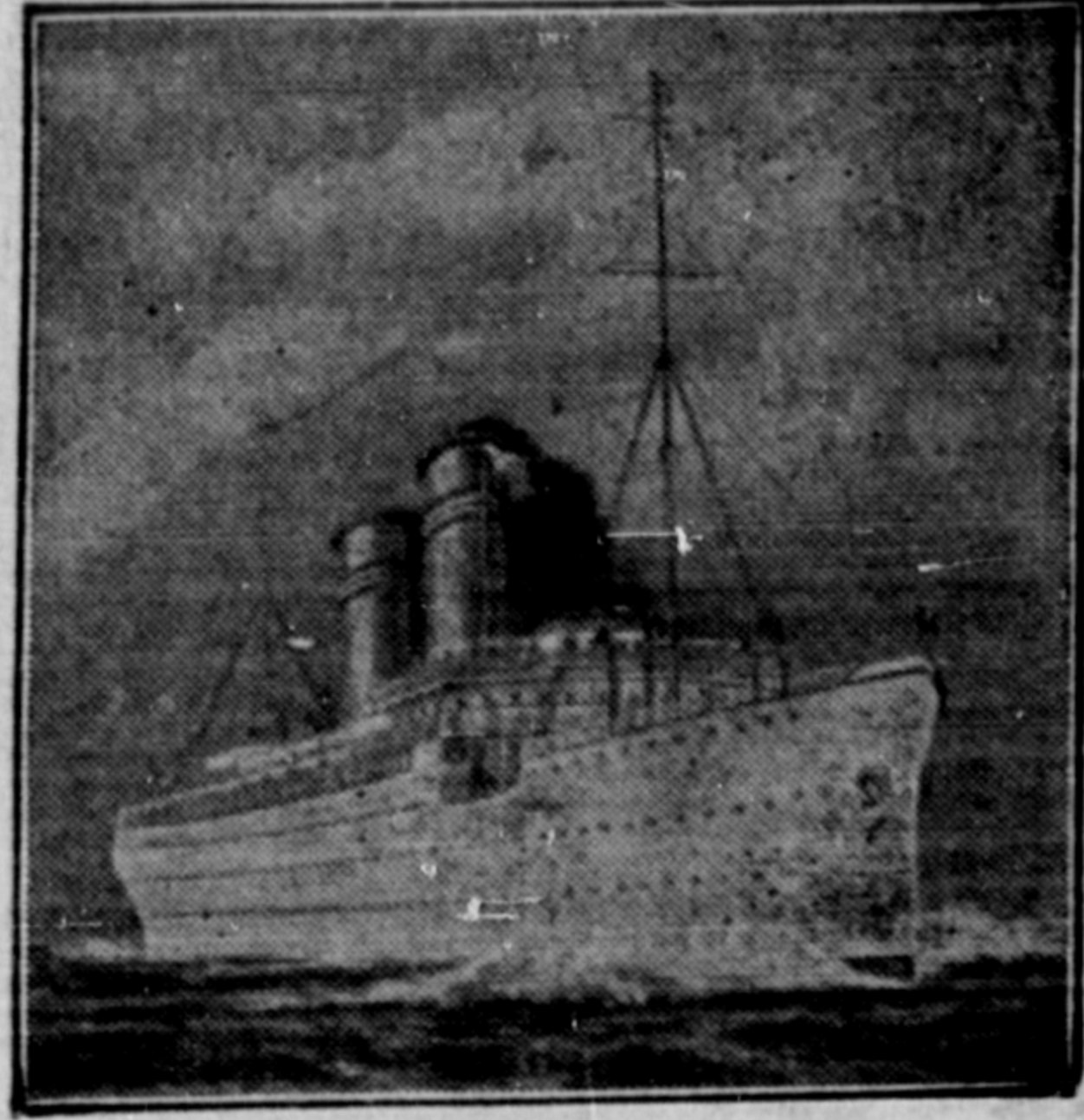

Amazing Things Happening.

Some rather amazing things are happening in this war. How the grizzled veterans of the service clubs, reading their newspapers in the same armchairs in the same West End bow windows that Thackeray knew so well, must rub their eyeglasses these afternoons.

Almost all the most dogmatic prognostications of the leading professors, and nearly all the most cherished precepts of the textbooks, have been scrapped by a year's experience of "the real thing."

Infantry practice has been turned topsy-turvy. Cavalry have been struck spurless into the trenches. The royal engineers have returned to a sort of second military childhood. The aboriginal earthworks have triumphed over the boasted steelclad modern fort. Napoleonic strategy has sagged up against a few strands of barbed wire. Hand-to-hand fighting with bayonet and hammers has replaced long range battles.

Robbed War of Pomp.

Subterranean immobility has destroyed the pomp and circumstance of swift open movements. Gas retorts have made the weather and the way the wind blows as important as when our archers drew their clothyard shafts at Cressy. Hand thrown bombs made out of pickle jars have played as large a part as shrapnel. Medieval shields and even body armor and steel headpieces have been resurrected.

The British infantry has actually used bows and arrows. And, in an immortal episode of death and glory, the regimental cooks of the B. H. A. have met and vanquished the Prussian Guards.

Hardly anything has fallen out as experts were fully entitled to expect, and nearly everything has happened that they would have been justified in dismissing as grotesque.

Your King and Country Need You

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

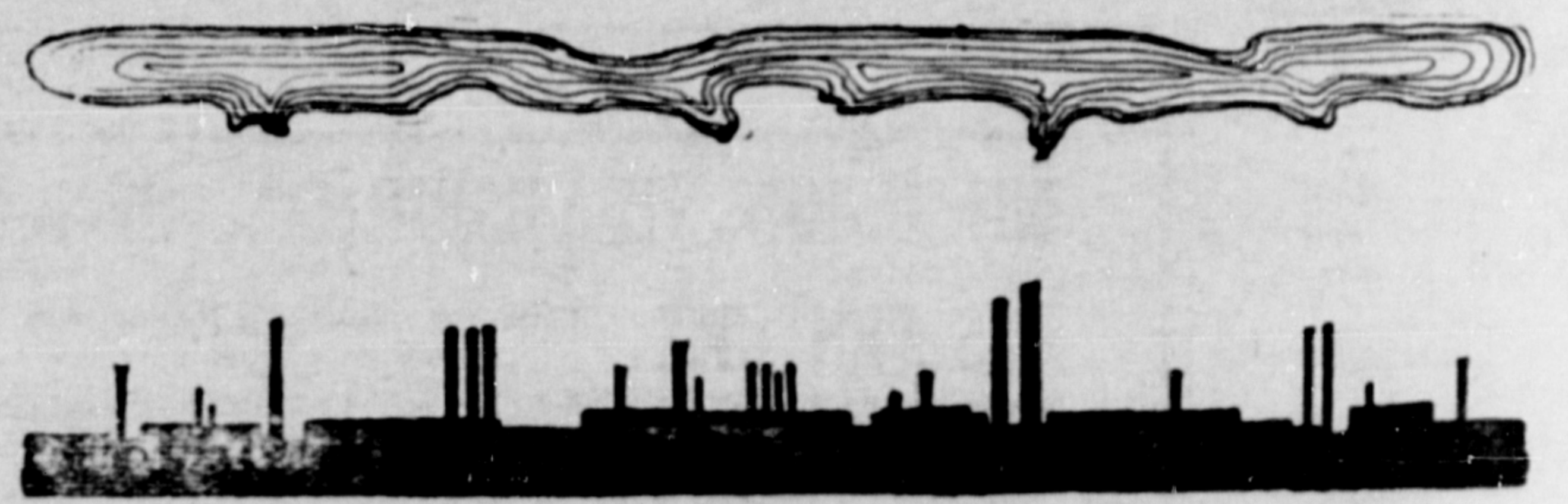
