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## HEAVY FIGHTING AROUND SERBIAN CAPITAL

### FRENCH TROOPS NOW IN SERBIA -- RUSSIANS HAVE SCORED MINOR VICTORIES

#### AUSTRO-GERMAN ATTACK ON THE SERBIAN CAPITAL

ENEMY REPULSED WITH HEAVY LOSSES AT THE SAVE—GERMANS ENTER BELGRADE ACROSS THE TISZA—THE FRENCH TROOPS IN SERBIA—BULGARIANS MAKE PROTEST

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 9.—An official report from Nish states that the advance guard of the Austro-German army has crossed the river Tisza at Belgrade. Part of the Serbian capital has been taken and part destroyed.

The division which tried to enter the city across the river Save was repulsed with enormous losses. Heavy fighting continues.

##### French in Serbia.

Athens, Oct. 9.—The French troops, which were landed at Salonika, are now in Serbia forming a base at Gievegal near the Greek frontier. The British troops are close behind and it is expected that all the Allied troops will be on Serbian soil on Tuesday.

##### Bulgarian Protest.

Bulgaria has made a strong protest against Greece permitting

the landing of the Allied troops, stating that it threatens the friendly relations at present existing between Bulgaria and Greece.

The Bulgarians are reported to be at Kusaneldt preparing to make a raid on the Salonika-Nish railroad in order to prevent the Allies from reaching the Serbian front.

##### Consul's Message

London, Oct. 9.—M. Angloff, Bulgarian consul here, has sent the following telegram to Premier Rhadoslavoff: "If the reported alliance of Bulgaria with her eternal enemies, the persecutors against the liberators, is true, I protest and tender my resignation to the Consul General."

##### Bulgarian Deserters.

There have been four thousand desertions from the Bulgarian army since mobilization began.

#### LABORERS DEBARRED FROM ENTERING CANADA

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—An order-in-council has been passed, in view of existing labor conditions in the Dominion, to the effect that no laborer or artisan will be admitted to Canada from October 1, 1915, to March 31, 1916.

#### STEAMER MARIPOSA HAS BEEN WRECKED

Capt. Mackenzie of the Prince Rupert reported this morning having passed the Mariposa, of Seattle, on the rocks about a mile below Old Bella Bella. She was high and dry forward, with her afterdeck awash. Her lifeboats were drawn up on the beach.

The Mariposa is owned by the Alaska Steamship Company, and left Seattle for the north on Wednesday with one hundred passengers on board. The passengers and crew reached the shore safely in the lifeboats and were picked up by a passing steamer. The ship is liable to become a total wreck.

E. L. Jatenaude, M. P. for La Prairie, has been appointed minister of inland revenues. Hon. Louis Coderre, who has been secretary of state since 1913, has retired and will succeed Hon. L. P. Pelletier as judge of the superior court of Quebec.

Hon. P. E. Blondin is promoted from the position of minister of inland revenue to that of secretary of state in succession to Mr. Coderre.

#### PRESIDENT WILSON VIEWS WORLD'S SERIES

Philadelphia, Oct. 9.—President Wilson, who is a keen baseball fan, witnessed the second game of the world's series between Philadelphia and Boston today. The president and his party viewed the game from a box near the centre of the grandstand. This is the first occasion on which the chief executive of the nation has attended a world's series contest.

Boston defeated Philadelphia by 2 runs to 1, making one victory each on the series.

#### HARRY LAUDER'S SON HAS EARNED CAPTAINCY

Harry Lauder's son has been promoted to the rank of captain.

Shortly after the outbreak of war Mr. John Lauder obtained a commission as second lieutenant in the 8th Battalion A. & S. Highlanders. He proceeded to the front on the completion of his training, and was wounded at Festubert.

After recovering from his wounds he went back to the trenches, but was taken ill and invalided home.—Edinburgh Dispatch.

#### MINOR RUSSIAN VICTORIES—MANY PRISONERS CAPTURED

NEARLY FOUR THOUSAND MEN AND A NUMBER OF MACHINE GUNS TAKEN—VIOLENT GERMAN ATTACKS AT LOOS REPULSED—A GERMAN TRANSPORT SUNK IN BALTIC

Petrograd, October 9.—An official report records a number of victories for the Russians on the eastern front. Northeast of Kli-van, 1,800 prisoners and a number of machine guns have been captured.

Between Dudno and Lutsk 1,500 men, 19 officers, 5 machine guns and one searchlight have been taken.

On the left bank of the Ikwa, 600 prisoners and three mortars have been captured.

##### Western Front.

Paris, Oct. 9.—Violent German attacks on Loos have been repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy.

The French have gained a foot-

hold in the fortified works of La Trapeze, taking 200 prisoners, bomb throwers and machine guns.

##### Hun Transport Sunk.

London, Oct. 9.—A British submarine in the Baltic has sunk a German transport by gun fire near the German coast.

##### Steamers Sunk.

The steamers, Silver Ash, of 3,700 tons, and the Scawby, of 3,600 tons, have been torpedoed.

##### NEW GOVERNORS

It has been officially announced at Ottawa that Dr. R. G. Brett, of Banff, will be appointed lieutenant-governor of Alberta, and R. S. Lake, ex-M. P. for Qu' Appelle, will be lieutenant-governor of Saskatchewan.

#### \$244.50 COLLECTED IN FINES IN SEPTEMBER

Chief Vickers' report for the month of September, presented to the police commission yesterday, showed that 42 cases were before the court during the month. There were 36 convictions, 5 cases were dismissed and one is still pending.

Fines to the amount of \$244.50 were collected. This is a considerable increase over the amount collected in August. Two \$50 fines for selling liquor to Indians helped to bring up the total. The operating expenses for the month were \$792.
