IMPERIALISM

While in the old country with Premier Borden recently, R. B. Bennett, of Calgary, addressed a gathering of Imperialists at the Royal Colonial Institute in London. In speaking of the effects of the war, he stated that one result would be a demand by the various Dominions for a voice in the control of Imperial affairs, through some central body of representatives at the capital of the Empire.

In this connection, it is well to remember Sir Wilfrid Laurier's definition of imperialism, which is that of Asquith, Grey, Haldane, Hareourt and Lloyd George, and which the Liberal leader aptly outlined at a memorable imperial conference: "Imperial unity based upon local autonomy." "That conception of imperialism is far more practical than that of the formalists and the doctrinaires who dream of centralization, forgetting that, in the words of Burke: 'The hold of Britain on the Dominions is the close affection which grows from common names, from kindred blood, from similar privileges and equal protection. These are the ties which, although light as air, are strong as links of iron.'"

COAL SHARES

The allotting of \$105,000 in shares by the directors of the Pacific Coast Coal Mines Company seems, from the evidence given before Mr. Justice Clement, to be a more flagrant piece of business than anything accomplished by the Roblin bunch in Manitoba, and the duty of the lieutenant-governor is perfectly clear. As the representative of the King, he must hold a searching enquiry into every circumstance of the case without delay.

There seems to be no ques-

tion as to the handing over of the stock, and it is self-evident that such an action had more behind it than mere friendship. In any case, it is ludicrous to suggest that the members of the syndicate should be made to pay for the personal love of Mr. Arbutnot for Dr. Young. The following extracts from the evidence leave little doubt as to the reason for Mr. Arbutnot's "generosity".

"I heard from Savage and Wishard that this was a corruption fund; I don't know whether for services rendered. Savage said there had been a contest over some foreshore in the Squash district, and at a hearing before the provincial executive the decision was rendered in favor of our company."—C. C. Michener.

"What was the relevancy of these statements made to you to these shares; what was the connection? You say there was a meeting of the executive; what had that to do with ten hundred and fifty shares?"—Mr. Justice Clement.

"My understanding of these conversations was that it had something to do with the decision."—C. C. Michener.

On Friday, Mr. Luther D. Wishard added his testimony to that of Mr. Michener. He had learned from McGavin and Savage that "some service of the greatest value had been rendered which was deserving of such compensation," that the \$105,000 in shares had been turned over to Arbutnot to be transferred by him to the person said "to be entitled to the compensation," that the services "related to a decision that was secured in connection with a negotiation connected with certain foreshore rights that were claimed by different parties."
