SERBIANS ARE FOLLOWING RUSSIAN TACTICS

COPPER MINE AND ARSENAL DESTROYED IN RETREAT -- ITALIANS SUCCEEDING

SERBIANS FLOOD COPPER MINES IN THEIR RETREAT

LARGEST MINES IN EUROPE RENDERED USELESS -- ARSENAL BLOWN UP--FRENCH REPEL BULGARIAN ATTACK AND ADVANCE--BULGARIAN SUPPLY TRAIN BOMBARDED

Paris, Nov. 3.—The Serbian copper mines, in the Bor region, which are the largest in Europe, have been flooded by the Serbians before they left the district, in order to render them useless to the advancing enemy.

Arsenal Blown Up.

The arsenal at Kraguyevatz, which is the largest in Serbia, has been blown up along with all the connecting military buildings.

French Advance.

The Bulgarians today attacked

a French force near Krivelsk, but were repulsed. The French are advancing in the region of Strumitza.

French Warships Busy.

French warships yesterday bombarded a Bulgarian supply train near Dede Agatch, the Bulgarian port on the Aegean Sea.

The Bulgarians are advancing beyond Veles, but the Serbians are still holding the principal defenses near Perlepe. The report that the Serbians have evacuated Monastir is denied.

PASSENGER STEAMER WRECKED IN THE SOUTH

Marshfield, Ore., Nov. 3.—The passenger steamer Santa Clara plying between Portland, Ore., and San Francisco, has been wrecked on South Spit, at the entrance to Coos Bay, 170 miles south of the Columbia river bar. Ten bodies have been recovered, but eight are still missing.

A party of life savers shot a line, by means of the rocket apparatus, over the vessel, which was half a mile out from the shore, and some thrilling rescues were made through the surf. The dead were all passengers on the ill-fated steamer.

AN EISTEDDFOD

At the close of the 4th century, when the Romans departed from Britain the Eisteddfod, or national bardic congress of Wales was originated. The object of these gatherings was to encourage bardism and general literature. The term "Eisteddfod" is of very ancient origin and means a session or sitting.

During the Middle Ages interest in Eisteddfods waned considerably, but at the close of the Napoleonic wars a great revival of Welsh nationalism took place. Since 1819 they have been held without intermission. Miniature Eisteddfods are becoming a common occurrence in many parts of Great Britain.

At the Methodist Church, Friday, November 26th, 1915, an Eisteddfod, on somewhat similar lines will be held. It is purely competitive and consists of five sections, music, literature, art, sewing and cooking. Each section is subdivided into a number of competitions to suit varying abilities. A prize of \$2.00 will be awarded the winner of each competition. Everyone eligible for entry, fee 25c.

Competitors for the music, elocution, impromptu speeches and answers will compete on the night of the 26th, when also the decision of the judges of other competitions will be announced.

WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE DEFEATED IN STATES

New York, Nov. 3.—The Woman's Suffrage Amendment has been defeated in the state of New York by a majority of 210,000, and in Massachusetts by 108,000. It also went under in Pennsylvania.

Republican Victory.

Boston, Nov. 3.—The Republican party has gained control of the executive of the state of Massachusetts. Samuel McCall has been elected governor by a majority of 6,606 over Governor Walsh. The legislature returns 34 Republicans and 6 Democrats.

Prohibition Defeated.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 3.—For the second time in two years, Ohio has rejected a prohibition amendment. On this occasion it was defeated by a majority of 40,000.

GROCCERS EARLY

CLOSING BYLAW

A petition signed by eight of the grocers appealing against the passing of an early closing bylaw applied to grocers, was presented to the council Monday night.

A second petition, signed by licensed traders handling groceries, was presented appealing against such a bylaw.

The petitions were laid on the table pending the discussion of an early closing bylaw for grocers.

As requested last week, the city solicitor presented a report on the matter of bringing in a grocers' early closing bylaw under Section 4 of the Shops Act, showing that the council could bring in a compulsory early closing bylaw if they so desired.

There was a general feeling that such a bylaw should be passed, though Ald. Edge suggested that the question of the cutting down of the amount of light used should be taken seriously into consideration.

Ald. Montgomery pointed out that the amount thus saved by the shopkeepers would be so much gained by the consumer.

The chief point of discussion was the hour of closing, Ald. Casey, Montgomery, and Nicol voted in favor of 6:30 p. m., and Ald. Dybhavn, Beveridge, Edge and the Mayor favored 7 p. m. The bylaw will be discussed in committee next week.

ITALIANS CONTROL HEIGHTS SURROUNDING MALBORGHETTO

FORT HANSEL, CENTRE OF AUSTRIAN SYSTEM OF DEFENCES, IS RENDERED USELESS--ITALIANS OCCUPY A COMMANDING POSITION--ROUMANIANS MAY FORM NATIONAL MINISTRY

Udine, Nov. 3.—Fort Hansel, which is the centre of the Austrian system of forts protecting Malborghetto, has been rendered useless.

Heights Occupied.

All the heights surrounding Malborghetto have now been occupied by the Italian forces and Italian heavy guns have been placed in position.

Roumania Wavering.

Milan, Nov. 3.—The Roumanian opposition, under the lead of M.

Jonescu, is doing its utmost to form a National Ministry, which would be favorable to the Allies.

It is semi-officially stated that Roumania will only enter the war after the Allies have landed half a million men on the Balkan front. Otherwise it is claimed, it would be impossible to wage war on two fronts.

The George E. Foster, of the Cold Storage Company, brought in 120,000 pounds of halibut last night.

FRESH HERRING PREFERRED AS BAIT

Captain Rorvik, of the Rorvik Fish Company, along with Bill Selig, the well known halibut fisherman, are making arrangements to embark on a new enterprise in the fishing business in Prince Rupert.

Satisfied that the halibut fishermen will not use frozen bait if fresh herring can be obtained, these gentlemen have decided to enter the fresh bait business with a view to supplying halibut men along the coast with the required article. Captain Rorvik claims, and he knows the business thoroughly, that fresh herring will always draw many more fish than frozen herring will.

The new concern expects to be able to supply many of the boats which at present buy bait in Vancouver and other ports, and the result should be highly beneficial to Prince Rupert.

CANADIAN CASUALTIES TO SEPTEMBER 30TH.

Sir George Perley, High Commissioner of the Dominion in London, furnished the following statistics regarding casualties in the Canadian contingent to September 30:

Killed in action: Officers, 96; other ranks, 1,557. Died of wounds: Officers, 27; other ranks, 650. Died of disease, etc.: Officers, 6; other ranks, 99. Wounded: Officers, 275; other ranks, 6,675. Prisoners of war: Officers, 38; other ranks, 1,246. Missing: Officers, 22; other ranks, 1,014. Total, 11,705.

REDECKING REPORT
