"King Constantine protests against any extension of the Serbo-Greek treaty to include as Tonight and Tomorrow the enemies of Greece any allies of Bulgaria who attack Serbia.

A lively incident illustrating the real feelings of the Greek parliament and people occurred during the sitting of the Chamber of Deputies just before Venizelos resigned. M. Venizelos, after having repeated that the cabinet intended to fulfil its obligations towards Serbia in case Bulgaria attacked that country, added, turning towards the press gallery, "Only some journalists, corrupted by foreign gold, can dream of preventing Greece from pursuing the path of honor."

Some of the journalists, rising in order to protest, the Premier called out in a loud voice, "Go; your place is not here."
