RACES WITH DEATH TO REACH HIS SON

Seattle, Nov. 3.—A race with death was won by Capt. K. B. Kirkland, president of the Pacific Sea Products Company, on Tuesday, when the steam whaler Unimak, of which he was in charge, arrived in port after a stormy voyage from Seward. Capt. Kirkland had piloted the whaler down the coast at full speed to reach Seattle before the death of his son, Lauritz Kirkland, who is at the Seattle General Hospital in a dying condition. The son was still alive at an early hour this morning, but attending physicians have abandoned all hope of his recovery and it is doubtful if he will survive the day. Capt. Kirkland has been in charge of the company's whaling station at Akutan since the early spring. The son, who was a member of the company, has been ill for nearly a year, during which time he underwent six operations. His condition did not become critical, however, until a few weeks ago. When physicians expressed doubt as to his recovery, the father was notified by cable and he immediately started for Seattle on the Unimak. The whaler was stormbound for six days at Kodiak Island and had an unusually rough time during the entire trip. Capt. Kirkland feared that his son had died before he could reach his bedside, but when he was told he was still alive he rushed to the Seattle General Hospital as soon as he landed and remained throughout the night. The son recognized his father and after an exchange of greetings lapsed into unconsciousness, from which he had not recovered at an early hour this morning.
