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LIBERALS HAVE CROWDED AND ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING

ser-McBride administration. Defeat these forty members, or a majority of them and you burst up the gang that has been looting the province for years in a manner which makes the Manitoba thefts look like thirty cents.

The Liberal platform provides that, when a prisoner is liberated from jail, he shall be provided with sufficient money to take him to his home. In view of the investigation which will be held when a Liberal administration takes office, this plank in the Liberal platform will no doubt appeal to many of the Conservative leaders, especially to the attorney-general who showed sufficient foresight of coming events at the last session of the legislature as to provide a salary for the leader of the opposition.

Misrepresentations.

Mr. Pattullo went on to say that the representative for this district and his supporters had been trying very hard all year to misrepresent him before the electors throughout the district. Many of the things circulated were too petty to pay any heed to them. One matter which the representative for this district had himself mentioned he would refer to for a moment.

Public Ownership.

There is a plank in the Liberal platform which provides for the public ownership of public utilities and Mr. Manson had cited the Hydro electric system of the city of Prince Rupert as an evidence that Mr. Pattullo was not in accord with this plank in the Liberal platform. "You will remember," said Mr. Pattullo, "that at the time I was mayor of this city, we submitted two light and power proposals to the electors of the city to pass judgment upon. I took no aggressive part as to either project. I gave to the public the fullest possible information as to both proposals that was available to us and asked the public to render a decision. No intelligent man, at all events, no man of stronger intelligence than prejudice, could construe the course which I took as repugnant to the plank in the Liberal platform providing for the public ownership of public utilities. However, no matter what any man may think of my attitude upon this plank of the Liberal platform we do know this, that Mr. Manson supports body and soul the gov-

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ernment which gave away all the water rights in this district, which rendered public ownership of public utilities impossible until the rights should be re-acquired by the public, and the present source of our water and power supply, Woodworth Lake, was purchased from a former president of the Conservative Association in Vancouver during the time that Mr. Manson was mayor of the city, for \$15,000. Of course a \$15,000 graft may be small compared to many that have taken place in Victoria, but if you take the thousands of similar grafts during the past dozen years and add them together you will realize why the province with all its resources and its tremendous revenues obtained from the sale of our capital assets, nevertheless, now owes some ten million dollars more than it did when the McBride administration first came into office.

Mr. Manson was having hard work to find any real argument against the candidacy of the speaker, but he was not depending upon argument. He is depending upon the power of the pap. He endeavors to make every district believe that every other

district is strongly in his favor in order to frighten them into his support. Manson's argument that it would be a bad thing to have an opposition member in the house is now being used against Manson himself, because the people are coming to the conclusion that the McBride government is doomed to defeat and that Manson would make a poor opposition member.

Mr. Pattullo said that although he was not yet member for the district—though he was getting closer to it every day—he had received advices that the raking over the coals which he had given the government for the outrageous roadwork throughout the district, had resulted in better work being done and that some improvement also had occurred in the hiring of men. The Liberal candidate, however, is properly being given the credit for this improvement.

Concluding, Mr. Pattullo said, "the fact is that it is time for a change and the people know it. Every day's delay in bringing on the election is another nail in the coffin of the government. Public sentiment at this time is too strong either to be bought off or hoodwinked and the McBride government is going, not to oblivion, because, alas, they have left too much to remember, but to a severe and stinging defeat."

Mr. Pattullo resumed his seat amidst loud and prolonged cheering.

H. L. Harris, late editor of the Bella Coola Courier, who followed Mr. Pattullo, told in a humorous strain some of the fearful and wonderful doings of the Tory machine in Bella Coola. He showed how one road superintendent figured on the payroll for one year; for 1 month @ \$155, 243 days @ \$5.50, and 122 days @ \$5.50. With no work on Sundays, this spell required a year of 451 days. He recounted in minute detail, referring to the public accounts, instance after instance of the crooked work and party favoritism carried out by R. O. Jennings and others at the instigation, or with the permission of William Manson. He cited cases where gross incompetence on the part of political bosses had squandered thousands of dollars of public money. He showed where one official, disgusted at the work which was bringing the government into disrepute in the district, protested at Victoria and was promptly fired for his pains.

He described the building of the Bella Coola jail seven feet below
