THE WAR LOAN
 The \$50,000,000 of Canadian Government bonds at 97½ bearing interest at 5 per cent, payable half-yearly, are a very attractive investment to those who are looking for something sure and safe. The fact that the proceeds are to be used purely for war purposes makes the issue attractive from a patriotic standpoint, in that investors are aiding the country to carry on the war, while, at the same time, they are making a sound investment. The man who purchases these bonds is doing something for his country just as surely as the man who is subscribing to the various patriotic funds. The bonds will be issued in denominations of \$100, \$500 and \$1,000. It is just possible that they would have been attractive to a larger number of the smaller investors had they been issued in smaller denominations, as were those of the Imperial government, but nevertheless the issue should be largely oversubscribed. They will be listed on the Montreal and Toronto Stock Exchanges.

TALKING ABOUT HOGS
 The Toronto Telegram, illustrating the failure of Canada's banks to recognize the great opportunities provided in the munition industry for business, says that "orders from the Shell Committee carried little or no weight with the banks. A Canadian manufacturer secured a contract for a certain article of war supplies. The price of the article was \$3.80. The manufacturer's cost was 75 cents. The overhead charge was 50 cents. The margin of profit on each article was \$2.55. Yet the banks would not carry this manufacturer until he had received returns

from contracts given by the Shell Committee."
 Glorious chance! Cost of goods \$1.25; profit \$2.55, or a little more than 200 per cent. And more glorious still, the British taxpayer footed the bill. Our dear motherland did the bleeding. Talking about hogs, does The Telegram know many more like the man who in time of war regarded the chance to gouge a 200 per cent. profit from his beloved country as a great opportunity lost because of the shortsightedness of the banks?—Toronto Globe.

 The provincial government is simply doing its duty in filling staff vacancies with men who have served their country. If it is necessary to hand out bouquets to a government for doing the obvious thing, the Conservatives are to be congratulated.

The Vancouver Province says: "It is a pity that Lavergne is only an honorary colonel. If he were a really truly colonel, there might be some way of punishing him for desertion in the face of the enemy or something like that." The latest quarterly military list, published in Ottawa, gives this gentleman full rank as lieutenant colonel of the 61st Regiment de Montagny, so that he is a "really truly colonel" after all. What are the Tories going to do about it?

The Victoria Colonist is bemoaning the fact that the McBride government has never received fair criticism. The Colonist need not worry now, as the funeral will leave nothing to be desired.

MARRIED MEN V. SINGLE DISCUSSED AT LENGTH

there. They could please themselves about that. The mayor suggested that Ald. Beveridge and Ald. Montgomery, who had brought in the motion, should say what was to be done. Ald. Montgomery said he was prepared to be one of a committee to consider the question.

Ald. Beveridge said he would be pleased to do the same. He proposed asking married men to apply for certain positions and, if a big number came in, he would suggest putting the names in a hat.

Ald. Nicol asked "what about men returning from the front?" Ald. Beveridge said they would get jobs wherever possible.

Ald. Casey warned the council not to get too excited over the matter. There would be plenty of married men and returned soldiers out of work and the matter should be dealt with as opportunity crops up. One reason why he opposed the spending of \$800 for a kitchen, which would probably have been scrapped anyhow, was that he felt the money could be employed in relieving the returned men. He was thoroughly in sympathy with the employment of married men wherever possible, but he did not believe in rushing and firing single men here, there and everywhere, simply because they were single. Wage earners have faced starvation two weeks ahead of them for years, and it is nothing new to them. He suggested that married men in want be asked to apply to the council for work, and the various departments could then consider the matter.

Ald. Beveridge pointed out that such cities as Vancouver were getting excited over the same question, and he saw no harm in Prince Rupert doing the same.

Ald. Montgomery said that Ald. Casey's plan was to sit tight and do nothing. He considered that the question had to be met and dealt with and that foresight must be exercised. There was no use of waiting until the matter became too large.

Ald. Edge said that he could not see how the council could act on this report. He thought the names in the various departments should be placed before the various committees, and that they bring in reports. He moved that the names be handed over to the various committees.

Ald. Nicol said that the various committees had already taken up (Continued on Page Three.)
