**GROUSE MOUNTAIN MINES LOOKING WELL**  
 Glowing reports are being received from Grouse mountain, the new Bulkley valley mining district, where five claims were recently bonded by R. P. Trimble, Pete Powers and partners, the contractors, are working on these properties, with results of a most encouraging nature. On Monday last the shaft was down thirty feet, all in solid ore, carrying excellent copper values which appear to increase with depth.  
 It is impossible at present to judge the width of the lead, as no walls have been found.  
 The present shaft will be continued to the 100-foot level, which is likely to be reached before Christmas.  
 Development on a large scale is being arranged for and will be started soon after the holidays. Mining men will watch with the greatest interest the opening up of this prospect, which shows every indication of becoming a big mine.—Omineca Miner.

**CAR HIRE**  
 The board of works, reporting to the council Monday on an account presented by J. R. Morgan for \$150 for car hire, stated that there was not enough evidence of the hiring of the cars to warrant passing the account.  
 Ald. Nicol said that there was absolutely nothing in the records to show that there had been any such transaction.  
 Ald. Dybhavn said that he believed that Mr. Morgan had ample evidence of having hired the cars to the city, and that the account should not be turned down unless the officials were certain that the cars had been returned.  
 Ald. Nicol said that Mr. Morgan had produced no evidence to show that the cars had been hired.  
 The mayor said that the city engineer had stated that the cars had not been hired. The board of works had referred the matter to the council that they might arrive at a conclusion. Mr. Lorenzen had gone into the matter fully and nothing could be ascertained to lead to the belief that the cars had ever been hired.  
 The matter was laid on the table pending a report from the city solicitor.

**ALTERATIONS WANTED IN FISHING REGULATIONS**  
 The following ten points constitute the questions which local fishing men desire Messrs Cunningham and McIntyre to bring before the advisory board at Ottawa.  
 1. Licenses for catching herring in both gill nets and seines be given to cover any territory in District No. 2.  
 2. Halibut fishermen to catch their own bait, having due regard to closed seasons and spawning grounds only.  
 3. Salmon licenses to be issued to all British subjects, Indians, and white men, who signify their intentions of becoming British subjects, said licenses to be good in any part of District No. 2.  
 3. The abolition of the boat rating, thereby forcing the cannery men to compete for their fish in the open market the same as buyers of halibut have to do.  
 4. Cannery licenses to be open to any applicant, without any limit to number. This is more a matter to impress upon the provincial government than it is on the Dominion.  
 5. The removal of restrictions on the exportation of crabs and any other fish for which a better price can be obtained in a foreign market.  
 7. The appointment of two residents of Prince Rupert to the advisory board of the Dominion. One of these to be a practical fisherman and the other a representative of the fish merchants.  
 8. The appointment of an inspector for District No. 2, who will report direct to Ottawa and have his headquarters at Prince Rupert.  
 9. The removal of a limit to the number of lines that a trowler is allowed to operate.  
 10. Abolition of licenses to canneries for exclusive right to fish creeks. Instead these creeks to be open to all fishermen, with the total exclusion of canneries.
