SUCCESSFUL MEETING

The Liberal meeting on Friday night was an unqualified success. The audience was large, and, what is much more important, each man followed with the keenest interest and attention the various phases of misgovernment described by G. R. Naden and Fred Stork. A few years ago, the detailing of figures in a political speech was considered a weariness to the flesh, and something to be left to the politicians themselves; the average man, at that time, was doing well and an odd million dollars thrown away here or there did not interest him. Today, there is a marked change. Every man is forced to examine every dollar, and every nickel for that matter, and the ruthless waste and extravagance of the McBride and Borden governments is being brought home with a stab that hurts.

The public today is interested in figures, at least in figures with the \$ mark in front of them, and it is very evident that the day of reckoning for the grafters is at hand. A few years ago, politicians such as McBride could get away very simply with grandiloquent vapors about the millions which would in the nature of things flow into British Columbia, but today men want to know where these millions are. They want to know what has been done with the \$16,000,000 which have been spent in one year. They are content to let the future depend upon the retrenchment and careful expenditure of the present. Air castles worth many millions do not interest them and longer, what they want is solid bed-rock fact. McBride and Bowser are now on trial before the tribunal of an awakened public opinion which cannot be

stalled off with big sounding nothings; they are not being examined as to what they will do, but must answer for what they have done.

among Sir Robert's supporters trod as it were on the heels of Mr. D. A. Thomas who came to this country as Lloyd George's special commissioner and speedily found the Shell Committee a scandal and a shame.

Mr. Thomas not only found the composition of the Shell Committee a grave scandal, but he told Premier Borden so, adding that the price asked for shells was as scandalous as the fact that the committee was largely occupied in handing out contracts

to its own members. He recommended that for the good of the Empire and the credit of Canada, the Shell Committee be dismissed or radically reorganized. He is also said to have wrenched a promise from Premier Borden that this would be done immediately. When day after day and week after week followed and it was not done, for the simple reason that the Committee positively refused to resign and the premier didn't have the heart to kick them out—when in short the Committee defied the premier and stuck to its highly profitable job like a limpet to a rock, Commissioner Thomas had to take the matter into his own hands and pressure was brought to bear from the British government which finally resulted in the purged Shell Committee as we see it today.

It was after this experience with Premier Borden that Commissioner Thomas gave out the opinion that Sir Robert was as spineless a man as he had ever seen in public life. And it was following Mr. Thomas' cue that Sir Robert's critics in his own party took up the cry and are now suggesting stronger leaders of whom there happens to be such a plentiful scarcity that Major General Sir Sam Hughes is mentioned as the next best bet. RUSSIA HAS THE WORLD'S LARGEST HOARD OF GOLD

The largest hoard of gold in the world is that held in the vaults of the Russian State bank, which now amounts to about \$850,000,000.

Ordinarily a visitor may travel from one end of the Russian Empire to the other and not see enough gold coin to buy a pair of shoes. Paper currency is used universally. The cheque system as it prevails in the United States and Britain, is practically unknown in Russia.

Although the larger cities have many fine banks, the provincial business man distrusts banks and there are hundreds of thousands of prosperous Russians who have never had a banking account in their lives. Their working capital is represented by paper currency of big denomination which they carry in a leather bag suspended by a thong around their neck.

In Russia the visitor may meet shaggy men whose dress and appearance suggest the artisan class, who are carrying with them constantly from five to ten thousand pounds in currency.—Ex.
