## FOUR HUNDRED GUNS SHELLLED CZERNOWITZ

### WILD NIGHT OF TERROR IN OHIO -- PACIFIC COAL DIRECTORS MUST PAY OVER

#### FOUR HUNDRED DEATH DEALING RUSSIAN GUNS

Terrific Bombardment Preceded the Russian Advance on Czernowitz -- Varna Again Attacked.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Jan. 8.—The nature of the determined Russian blow on the Bessarabian front may be judged by the fact that the Russians concentrated four hundred guns on Czernowitz and continued a terrific bombardment for fifty hours before the infantry attack was made.

**Varna Bombarded.**  
The Russian forces are again bombarding Varna, the Bulgarian port in the Black Sea.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE VICKERS

At the meeting of the police commission yesterday afternoon, Chief Vickers brought in his report for the year. It showed that 276 cases had been dealt with, there being 246 convictions and 30 dismissals. Fines to the amount of \$1,502.65 were collected.

The work of the force had been conducted with just about half of the staff of the previous year. The chief gave credit to the criminal investigation department for the fact that Prince Rupert had been wonderfully free from any criminal element during the year. The chief said that he had received very satisfactory service from every member of the force. The commissioners complimented Chief Vickers on the able manner in which his department had been conducted.

#### STRIKE LEADS TO TERRIBLE RIOTS IN OHIO

Four Killed and Forty Wounded in Wild Night of Terror in Youngstown—Business Section Burned.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Youngstown, Ohio, Jan. 8.—Four are dead and forty wounded while damage to the extent of \$1,000,000 has been done by fire, as a result of a wild night of terror, occasioned by a strike of the employees of the Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company. One hundred of the rioters were jailed.

#### National Guard Called.

Four companies of the National Guard and two companies of militia have arrived and martial law has been declared. Ten blocks, along with the entire business section of the town have been burned.

The rioters burned a bridge; seized the company's hospital, and barricaded it in preparation for siege against the Ohio National Guard.

#### STRANDED JAPS WERE NOT WHAT THEY CLAIMED

From reports in the China Free Press, it appears to be perfectly clear that the eight Japanese who were stranded on the islands some time ago were not shipwrecked fishermen, but were simply Japs who wanted to land on the continent without worrying about the formality of interviewing the immigration authorities.

It seems that these men purchased a schooner in Japan, and loaded supplies of rice, potatoes, etc. with the express purpose of drifting across the Pacific to this land of promise. This episode demonstrates the eagerness of the Oriental to enter this land of plenty.

#### PACIFIC COAL MANIPULATORS FOUND GUILTY

Secret Profits Must be Returned to Treasury — Debenture Issue is Declared Invalid.

Victoria, Jan. 8.—Mr. Justice Clement, in giving judgment in the Pacific Coal Mines case, declares that the million and a half of debentures, issued under the act of the legislature of 1911, is invalid, and that Arbutnot and his associates are to return \$425,000 in bonds to the treasury with interest.

All secret profits arising from the sale of coal leases to the company, in exchange for \$1,320,000 in shares, are to be returned.

His Lordship declares that the shares received by Dr. Young were improperly taken from the company's treasury.

#### House Opens Thursday.

Ottawa, Jan. 8.—The House of Commons opens on Thursday. The government will ask for a twelve months' extension and it is believed that the Liberals will assent to the measure.

#### JACK EDWARDS NOW STATIONED IN ENGLAND

Ed. Doyle last night received a card from Jack Edwards, who is now in England. Jack is a sergeant in the 2nd Pioneer Regiment, which is commanded by Col. Davis, formerly of Prince Rupert.

Mr. Edwards left here for Vancouver last fall, where he enlisted. His regiment is stationed at Haxley Down, Winchester, Eng.

#### NEWEST TYPE OF ZEPPELIN IS DESTROYED

Airship caught in telegraph wires at Namur—Austrians are Called to stop the Russian Rush.
