THE BALKANS

The latest report from the Near East, to the effect that Von Mackenzen will lead the Central Powers against Saloniki, is a direct contradiction of the despatch of the day before, but is probably the true one. First, the Germans were sending this great leader to Alsace to engineer a big offensive; then he was going to the Bessarabian front to stop the Russian advance, and now we have him remaining in Serbia. Well, he has got to be somewhere, and will be kept equally busy no matter on which front he may be placed.

It is gratifying to find that the Greek soldiers are ready and anxious to fight. All they need are the necessary orders, and they will be at the throats of the Turks and Bulgars in a flash. It is now quite clear that the Greek people will not stand for an invasion of their country by the Central Powers, no matter where their ruler's sympathies may be.

If the reports of newspaper strategists are worth anything, the position of the Allies at Saloniki is impregnable no matter though the Austrians, Germans, Bulgarians and Turks have many more men than are at the disposal of the Allies. There is no doubt that in any such action, the huge fleet which is watching the Greek coast will be able to assist materially in the shelling of the enemy's positions. If the Saloniki attack is begun, it is a clear intimation that Germany's designs on Egypt are still uppermost, as there is nothing to be gained by simply taking Saloniki. The great way to the Far East is undoubtedly the ultimate object. That the Central Powers will ultimately fail in their object seems just as certain as the fact that they failed to reach Paris.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

MINISTER OF LABOR WAS WRONGLY REPORTED

"My principle," said Mr. Crothers, "is that if there are any positions in the public service held by young men with no encumbrances, and their duties can be undertaken by disabled soldiers, who have risked their lives and suffered for their country, the soldiers should get the positions."

DECLINE SUBSTITUTES BELGIUM GAVE ALL FOR CIVILIZATION

"If Belgium starves, says John Galsworthy, the English author, the civilized world incurs a stain more black than we dare to contemplate. A little country gave itself for civilization and civilization, having the means, to save it, let it perish. We are dealing here not with words, ideals and what not, we are dealing with hunger—a very simple thing, if people are not fed, they will die. No ultimate victories, vindications, and indemnities are of the least use to Belgians, starving now. If they are not kept alive—on the shoulders of this country, the richest country and that which has gained the most by Belgium's suffering, the reproach will be the heaviest. Verily it will."

Mr. Galsworthy's words were addressed to England, but as an integral part of the British Empire, Canada must take a part of them to herself. Not a few Canadians have already realized their import and have been striving to do their part in bearing Britain's burden of caring for and feeding starving Belgium—the not long ago prosperous little country, which sacrificed all for Britain and for civilization. The story has been told too many times for Canadians not to realize the awful importance of it. A glance into the offices of the Belgian Relief Committee at 59 St. Peter St., Montreal, is sufficient to see that something is being done, but at the same time there is much more to be accomplished. The committee is sending its appeal broadcast over Canada and its plea is only for wheat to grind into flour to make bread for starving women and children.

of the day of the nomination; the said writing may be in the form numbered five in the schedule of the Municipal Elections Act, and shall state the names, residence, and occupation or description of each person proposed in such manner as sufficiently to identify such candidate; and in the event of a poll being necessary, such poll will be opened on the 13th day of January, 1916, in the Council Chamber at the City Hall, Fulton Street, from the hour of 9 a. m. to the hour of 7 p. m., of which every person is hereby requested to take notice and govern himself accordingly.

Qualification for Mayor.

The persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as the Mayor of any city shall be any person who is a male British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, not disqualified under any law, and has for the six months next preceding the day of nomination been the registered owner in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the city of assessed value, on the last municipal assessment roll of One Thousand Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who is otherwise duly qualified as a Municipal Voter.

Qualification for Alderman.

Persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as Aldermen of a City shall be such persons as are male British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years, and who are not disqualified under any law, and have been for the six months next preceding the day of nomination the registered owners, in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the City of the assessed value on the last Municipal Assessment Roll of Five Hundred Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who are otherwise duly qualified as Municipal Voters.

School Trustees.

I am notified by the Secretary of the School Board that it will be necessary to hold an election for two trustees to serve for a term of two years, to take the place of Messrs. P. W. Anderson and Dr. W. T. Kergin, whose terms have expired, also for a trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. A. Kirkpatrick, to serve for a term of one year. It will therefore be necessary that nominations be handed to the Returning Officer at the place and time as in the case of Mayor and Aldermen provided by Statute as set out above.

In city school districts of the first, second or third class, any person being a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, and having been for the six months next preceding the date of nomination the Registered Owner in the Land Registry Office of land or real property in the city school district of the assessed value on the last Municipal Assessment roll of Five Hundred Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and being otherwise qualified to vote at an election of school trustees in the said school district, shall be eligible to be elected or to serve as a school trustee in such city school district.
