#### M. P. M'CAFFERY IS ELECTED MAYOR BY GOOD MAJORITY

THOMAS McClymont heads the list of successful aldermanic candidates—three of last year's council returned

The municipal election yesterday came out pretty much as was anticipated. The return of M. P. McCaffery as mayor for 1916 was a foregone conclusion. In the mayoralty vote there were about 600 votes polled, showing that both sides worked hard in getting the vote out. The following are the figures:

**MAYOR M'CAFFERY**  
The returning of M. P. McCaffery as mayor is a triumph for broad-minded citizenship which knows no faction or party, but recognizes that the welfare of the city is the one thing of paramount importance. Mayor McCaffery polled a large number of votes from all sections of the community, and, if the vote could be analysed, it would be found that he had a stronger working-man vote than S. M. Newton. The fight is over and M. P. McCaffery is now everybody's mayor, and is ready and willing to devote every energy he possesses to the welfare of the city as a whole.

#### PUBLIC MEETING IN WESTHOLME THEATRE

Thanks to the generosity of Mr. Albert, the Westholme Theatre was last night placed at the disposal of the citizens for the usual after-election meeting. George Frizzell presided over a large audience, having with him on the platform the mayor-elect, ex-Mayor Newton and the newly-elected aldermen.

Mayor-elect McCaffery, after thanking the electors for the great honor they had conferred upon him in making him chief magistrate for the year, congratulated the Trades and Labor Council on the manner in which they had conducted their campaign.

He congratulated the citizens on the board of aldermen which they had placed in power. He believed that they would make a splendid council.

He was particularly pleased that there had been no trace of party politics in this election. In every phase of the campaign, political party had been entirely eliminated, which was just as it should be in municipal affairs. His election was largely to be attributed to circumstances which he did not control.

Mayor McCaffery said in conclusion that he would give to the city the best that was in him. He would conduct its affairs along the lines on which he had conducted his own business, or a business which he had been engaged to manage. He again thanked those who had voted for him and assured those who had not that they would, had they known him better. As mayor, he represented now all the citizens and would carry on the duties of his office with "charity to all, and malice toward none."

Ex-Mayor Newton assured the electors that he had this same dose before, though, on this occasion, he still believed he could have won had he set to work on the voters' list last September. He did not accept the defeat as an indication that his efforts had not been in the best interests of the city.

He took exception to the statement that there had been no politics in the fight, as both parties had combined to defeat him. He assured them, in spite of reports to the contrary, that he would still remain here and stay with the game. The same combination had beaten him before, and he came back. He had still the same staying power. He extended to every elector his very best wishes, and wished the mayor-elect every success.

The new aldermen expressed appreciation of and thanks for the confidence placed in them and promised to work together for the benefit of the city. "God Save the King" brought the meeting to a close.

#### MONTENEGRO PUTS ITALY IN A BAD POSITION

Vienna Claims Cetinje has been Captured—Montenegro will Make Separate Peace With Austria.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 14.—Following the occupation of the heights dominating Cattaro and Cetinje by the Austrians, Montenegro accepts an armistice from the Austrians, and will negotiate a separate peace.

This new phase of the campaign seriously affects the Italian domination of the Adriatic. The Italians are criticised for their delay in assisting Montenegro. Vienna announces the capture of Cetinje, the capital of Montenegro.

#### Escaped Germans Captured.

Wilmington, Jan. 14.—Four of the German officers who escaped from German warships at Norfolk have been arrested. Altmann and Klatzstein were working on a United States dredge in connection with the building of fortifications, while Truger and Ehrmann were employed in textile mills.

These four officers boarded at a house but a stone's throw from the Hagley Yards of the plant of Dupont Powder Company, where mills were recently blown up.

#### BIG APPROPRIATION ASKED FOR ALASKA LINE

Washington, Jan. 12.—Another \$2,000,000 to push the Alaskan railway further into the interior of Alaska was asked before the house appropriations committee today by Chairman Edes of the Alaskan engineering commission. Congress already has appropriated \$3,000,000. Mr. Edes said the commission was eager to hasten the work to Matanuska coal fields and begin work from Kern creek to Anchorage Junction along the Tunagan river.

#### BRITISH COLUMBIA MAYORALTY ELECTIONS

Vancouver, Jan. 14.—McBeath has been elected mayor. The following is the result of the vote: McBeath, 3,122; Kirkpatrick, 2,488; Martin, 1,908; Hepburn, 1,502; and McNeil, 1,234.

Thomas Duke and Walter Leek were elected licence commissioners. In North Vancouver, Mayor Hanes was re-elected; New Westminster returned Mayor Gray by acclamation; Busby was elected mayor in Nanaimo; J. J. Malone has been re-elected mayor of Nelson, while H. F. McKinnon was returned for Revelstoke and Mayor Wilson was re-elected in Rossland by acclamation. Mayor Wilson is Lorne Campbell's opponent in the forthcoming by-election. In Grand Forks, Dr. Acres was elected mayor.

#### EX-PRESIDENT HUERTA HAS PASSED AWAY

El Paso, Jan. 14.—The Mexican government has issued orders to kill or capture all the bandits concerned in the massacre of Americans. El Paso is quiet today after the riots in which Mexicans were attacked.

Villa's general Almeida has been shot by the Carranza party. General Victoriana Huerta, the former president, has died of liver disease.

#### SERIAL BONDS ENDORSED

The vote on the question of submitting a private bill to the legislative assembly in regard to the changing of the basis of the city's indebtedness from the sinking fund plan to that of serial or annuity bonds was endorsed by the citizens yesterday by 424 votes to 60. There were 118 ballots returned unmarked.

#### SEATTLE STILL WORRYING OVER PRINCE RUPERT

Grand Trunk Pacific Terminal Gets More Free Advertising From Southern Railroad Men.

Seattle, Jan. 14.—The conference of the North Pacific Coast Passenger Association has been adjourned without reaching any agreement regarding the proposal of the American railroad and steamship lines, having their terminals in Seattle, to make mutual reductions in their rates to meet competitive railway and water fares announced by the Grand Trunk Pacific Company.

It was conceded by members present that the G. T. P., with its shorter haul, will ultimately divert a large traffic from Puget Sound. The C. P. R. has met a reduced rate of \$10. The proposal by the railroads to make a reduction of \$6 if the steamboats reduce the remaining \$4 was not agreed to by the vessel companies. It is expected that they will resume negotiations a month hence.
