LIBERAL ASSOCIATION HOLDS ENTHUSIASTIC GATHERING

a gambling den and a bucket-shop. For a while, by selling the country's resources on margin, a golden stream flowed in. This stream was so often referred to and held up to the public gaze that ultimately greed demanded a share. That money had gone to organize Conservative parties throughout the province and feed the party flock.

The land was held back from the farmer by the speculator, that the latter might reap the gold. City speculation grew and was encouraged, with the result you all know. Timber was grabbed for miles and miles and everything was to bring easy money. The government surplus was spent and the future mortgaged. Mr. Lynch went fully into the railroad policy, showing where the people had been fooled. Bad government, and bad government only, was at the root of the misfortunes of the province.

D. W. Morrissey, after assuring the audience that he had been a life-long Liberal, went on to show how the province had been misgoverned, after which he dwelt at length on the great natural wealth of this north country.

Dealing with reciprocity and Laurier naval policy, he went on to show that both would soon be accomplished facts. Mr. Morrissey then dealt at length with national finance, seeking to show that the borrowing of money by the government at home tended to tighten up business and restrain the circulation of money. He urged strongly the idea of a more elastic currency.

Geo. W. Nickerson said that Sir Richard had been a victim of circumstances; now he is a victim of Bowser, and Turner is a victim of Dick, the people being called upon to pay two agent-generals now instead of one.

He dealt at length with the Natal Act and the "Better Terms" question, both of which Victoria had been silent on for five years, though Laurier, up to that time, was blamed for turning them down. The McBride government had been insincere in both measures. He described Wm. Manson as in no sense a representative of this district, but simply a part of the Tory machine. In regard to cannery licenses and the doing away with boat rating, he had utterly failed.

Mr. Nickerson dealt very ably with the Laurier naval scheme, showing how Borden and Foster went back on the resolution which they supported, and instanced Australia as an example of what Canada might have been in this war. He went on to show that had Laurier remained in power the drydock would today be building ships and the marine station would be what it was intended for. When Laurier is returned to power, as he will be, Prince Rupert will come into her own. He looked forward to seeing T. D. Pattullo and A. M. Man-

son sent to Victoria, and Fred. Stork to Ottawa.

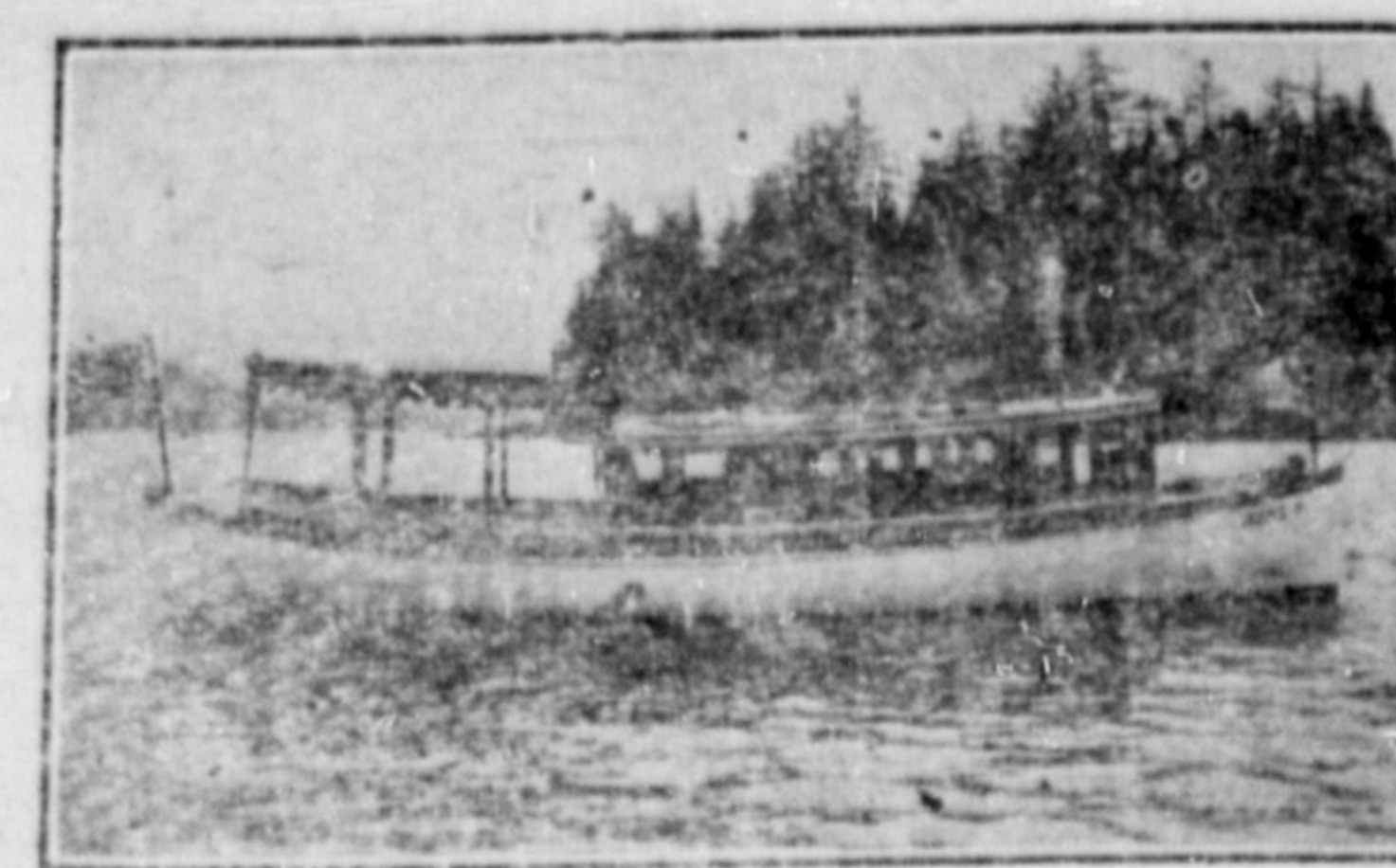
