Finally but he would like to hear Robbie Burns' opinion of British Columbia today.

Stephen King, president of the Sons of England, conveyed to the Scots the good wishes of his society. He dwelt upon the great good fellowship which existed between the two bodies, and expressed a belief that the war would tend to draw the two peoples still closer together. Of Burns as a politician, he felt pretty sure that Robbie would not have been a prohibitionist.

During the evening a splendid musical program was rendered, in which the following gentlemen gave of their best: W. V. Davie, R. Dowther, C. R. Murray, G. R. Jones, A. Clapperton, A. Maguire, W. Martin, S. King and Mr. Kinnear. Most enjoyable readings from the works of Robert Burns were given by David Thomson. Special mention must be made of the work of W. V. Davies as pianist, and the duets by Messrs. Jones and Clapperton.

S. D. Macdonald, seconded by Stephen King, moved the following resolution, which was carried amid enthusiastic cheers: "Resolved, that this gathering of Prince Rupert St. Andrew's Society, on the occasion of its seventh anniversary of the birth of Robert Burns, extend to the boys of our society and of the Sons of England who are in the trenches, or in training for the trenches, our hearty good wishes and Godspeed in their work for the Empire."

Fred Skork, as a visitor, expressed the great pleasure it has always given him to be present at these gatherings and moved a hearty vote of thanks to officers of the society who had provided such an excellent program and entertainment. This was seconded by Stephen King.

Rev. H. R. Grant, seconded by George H. Munro, proposed a hearty vote of thanks to those outside of the society who had done so much in providing the entertainment and to the chairman who had carried the evening along so splendidly.

A vote of thanks to the press and the singing of "Auld Lang Syne" and "God Save the King" brought a great evening to a close.




