Now why should sober-minded Conservatives make such a howl about Col. Lavergne's treasonable vaporings especially when they approved without protest the Borden government's rewards of office to other Nationalists as anti-British and as treasonable in their talk as he? Indeed it may happen with him as it has happened with the others: the measure of his treason may prove to be the measure of his fitness for cabinet appointment, or for the Speaker's chair or for a seat on the Bench.

The plain fact is that, up to the present time, Lavergne, with all his wild words, has not been quite so offensive in his anti-British talk as were the half-dozen Nationalists who have been set in the seats of the mighty. Indeed he has this superior merit in that he has been consistent in his treason, while some of the others changed their political coats, but not their political character, and so, while Nationalists in their hearts, rejoice in the leaves and fishes of ultra-loyal Conservative office. Lavergne of late years has not been slack in his devotion to Nationalism as it is in Quebec, but in tireless zeal and in extravagant talk he was equalled if not outdone by Nantel and Blondin and Pelletier and Patenaude and Sevigny. He is still at his old job—their old job. They, every man with his tongue in his cheek, have been made "Hon." in name by the very government to which these sober-minded Orange-loyalists in Ontario gave their implicit allegiance. Is it not, therefore, condemnation of themselves when these straight-going Conservatives condemn the utterances from Lavergne which their party leaders in the gov-

ernment condoned and honored in Lavergne's associates?

Of course the pap-fed organs of cabinet ministers are not free agents. They must dance when their masters play. Their attitude to this whole miserable Nationalism movement depends wholly on what uses cabinet ministers like Messrs. Cochrane and Rogers and Reid and near-ministers like Sir Herbert Ames, think they can make the Nationalists serve. Usually it is deemed politically prudent to denounce the Nationalists in Ontario, but in Quebec the government gives them offices of high honor and high salaries.

Years ago Bourassa and Lavergne called themselves Liberals, but when they betrayed Liberalism and revealed the horns and hoofs of narrow anti-British Nationalism they were given short shrift, and never once did Sir Wilfrid Laurier allow them to play fast and loose with Canada's fundamental political principles. No one of these treason-talkers is allowed either to pretend to be a Liberal or to carry the honor badge of a Liberal office. Had Premier Borden repudiated the alliances made with Bourassa and the Nationalists by Hon. Frank Cochrane, Sir Herbert Ames, and others among his lieutenants, the impudence now flaunting itself in Quebec would have been castigated out of the way long ago. The humiliation of today is the natural out-growth of the Conservative-Nationalist alliance of 1911. That noisome brood of cross-breed chickens are not yet all home to roost.—Toronto Globe.

favorite resort for knight hawks, half a dozen of whom may generally be seen hanging around for crumbs.

Ottawa affords every convenience for knights who want to keep fit. The parliamentary library devotes a special section to their clothes, telling how to fold them neatly, how to ward off moths, and how to prevent dress swords from rusting by using them to comb the hair. Other books instruct the novice knight how to wear his coat, where to pin his medals, and when to leave his collar off. It appears that some days are Collar Days with the knights and some days are not, the latter probably when heavy work is to be done. Curiously enough no knight has been seen within the purlieus of Parliament without his collar and no doubt the absence of this aid to hauteur would be considered eccentric. In the Mother Country radical knights may sometimes appear in public without their collars as a matter of principle, but in Canada it is held to be bad form.

In days of old when a knight dressed for action he called in the plumber who charged him sixty cents an hour, and his time going and coming. But that expensive and inconvenient period is long gone by and nowadays when a knight would don his war paint he sends for the ladies tailor and the man milliner to button him up and tell him whether his feathers are on straight. Ottawa has a large number of these useful artificers and their bills are said to be fairly reasonable.

Another form of entertainment for knights is said to be the Round Table which is held at the residence of one of the leading
