THRILLING NEWS

In the capture of the German cruiser Roon by the Drake, the ability of the British navy to more than hold its own with the enemy is again exemplified. It was particularly appropriate that the commander of the Drake, Capt. Seagrave, should have been on the Monmouth when Admiral Craddock's squadron of slow cruisers was defeated by a superior German fleet under Von Spee off Coronel, and it must have thrilled the heart of the gallant British captain when he was given an opportunity to repay the debt incurred that day off the Chilean coast.

The news of the capture would be received with great jubilation by the officers and men on board of the watchdogs in the North Sea, and there would be many fervent prayers go up that they might be given just such an opportunity. If there is any truth in the report that there is naval activity around Kiel, and a prospect of the German fleet at last venturing out to sea, whether they are armed with specially big guns or any other new contrivance, Jack Tar will give them a right warm welcome.
