A. C. The heckler agreed and Sir Edward asked, "Have you stopped beating your wife?" Mr. Heckler suddenly disappeared.

NEW PROGRAM

The Victoria Colonist is taking the only line it possibly can in the by-election, and is seeking to divert public attention from the misdeeds of the McBride-Bowser administration and focus it upon the new program. There is absolutely nothing which the Tories can think of that will not be done just as soon as they get round to it. They won't even appoint a single royal commission to

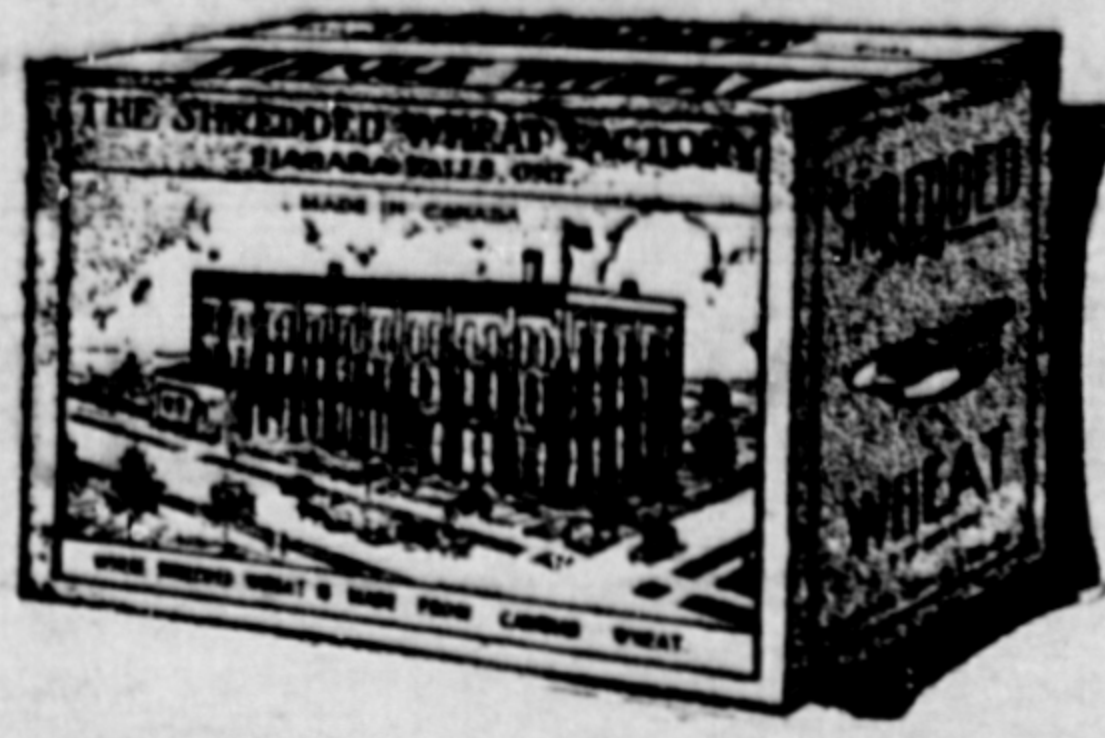

DARING PARACHUTE DESCENT BY OFFICER

Undoubtedly the most daring aeronautical feat on record was that performed by Lieut.-Colonel E. M. Maitland, who commands the Airship Section of the Naval Air Service, and who recently jumped from a balloon flying over London at a height of 10,000 feet, descending by parachute. Hitherto, the record seems to have been held by that intrepid balloonist, Captain Baldwin, who in 1887 claimed to have descended from a height of one mile (5,280 ft.) in just over three minutes.

Colonel Maitland was fifteen minutes coming down, and he confessed that the most trying part of the experience for him was before the parachute opened. He fell several hundred feet dead weight, and the suspense "seemed like eternity," but at last the parachute opened and the descent continued steadily.

The feat was the result of a discussion which took place concerning a certain official project, a question arising as to whether a balloonist could make a safe descent from such a height. "Someone," said Lieut.-Col. Maitland. (Continued on Page 4)

WATER NOTICE
