HORRIBLE MASSACRE OF SERBIAN WOMEN

CROWN PRINCE AGAIN FOILED—RUSSIANS CONTROL ASIA TO PERSIAN GULF

FIENDISH WORK BY BULGARIANS AND AUSTRIANS

Women and Children Slaughtered in Thousands in Serbia—The Russians Control Asia to the Persian Gulf.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 22.—The Allied governments are in possession of evidence of horrible massacres by the Austrians and Bulgarians in Serbia, which exceeded in brutality the Armenian massacres by the Turks. There are 700,000 victims, whole districts having been depopulated by the machine gun fire and bayonet work of the enemy.

Three thousand women and children refugees, who were seeking safety in a Belgrade church, were locked in and suffocated by gas bombs.

Russian Control

The complete control of Persia, Armenia and Mesopotamia by the Russians is assured. A new Russian army is now moving towards the Persian Gulf and will advance to the relief of General Townshend at Kut-El-Amara, after which the joint armies will carry out an attack upon Bagdad.

CROWN PRINCE AGAIN FOILED BY THE FRENCH

No Infantry Attacks upon Verdun Last Night—New Move Defeated—Heavy Losses at Zeebrugge.

Paris, March 22.—There were no infantry attacks upon Verdun last night, the fighting being confined to artillery work at Malancourt and east of the river Meuse.

The German Crown Prince's effort to apply a nut-cracker squeeze on a narrow sector ten miles north of Verdun has failed.

The German force which was advancing east of the Meuse was met by a withering fire from the French artillery and driven back.

Zeebrugge Raid.

Amsterdam, March 22.—Two hundred were killed and three hundred and fifty injured in the Allied air raid on Zeebrugge on Monday, from which the Allied aviators returned safely.

VILLA HAS ELUDED THE AMERICAN TROOPS

San Antonio, March 22.—General Pershing's failure to report an encounter with General Villa is taken as an indication that the chief has again effected his escape. The 24th Infantry and a cavalry battalion are to go forward this week.

It is reported that Villa is in possession of the oil fields south of Tampico and that he is demanding a ransom of two million pesos in order to prevent their complete destruction.

ONTARIO CONSIDERS A PROHIBITION BILL

Toronto, March 22.—The Ontario government is today discussing the first reading of its prohibition bill. The bill is a war measure and becomes effective on September 1st this year.

The government will take a referendum on the continuance of prohibition at the close of the war.

DR. L. W. KERGIN SAILED FROM ST. JOHN MARCH 11TH

Dr. Kergin has received word that his brother, Dr. L. W. Kergin, sailed for England on the Metagami from St. John on March 11th. There were twelve doctors on board and 4,200 men. The Metagami will by this time have landed her troops in England.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE BILL INTRODUCED YESTERDAY

Victoria, March 22.—Mr. Place, member for Nanaimo, introduced in the legislature yesterday a Woman Suffrage Bill, which will become effective on June 1st of this year, if passed.

Mr. Parker Williams, member for Ladysmith, gave notice of a bill to prevent the importation of laborers into the province.

Mr. L. W. Shatford, in a speech to the address, advocated the assisting of prospectors by giving them a free government assay.

THEO. COLLART WOUNDED BY A SHELL SPLINTER

Joe Collart has received a postcard from his brother Theo, from a military hospital at La Panne in France. Theo was wounded in the head by a splinter of shell from a big gun, but is now doing well and expects to be on duty again shortly.

PRINCE GEORGE BOYS ARRIVED LAST NIGHT

The men were taken right aboard the Prince John for Comox, where they will link up with the rest of the Battalion. They were a strapping body of men, quite a number of them showing South African ribbons.

Recruiting Sergeant Charles Youngman sent two recruits along with the contingent, one of these being Corporal Charles Higgs of the American army who recently received his discharge at Haines, Alaska. Corporal Higgs made a striking figure in his smart uniform. He is a British subject, having been born and raised at Bloemfontein, the capital of the Orange Free State, formerly a Boer colony in South Africa.
