### BARBERS FINED

At the police court this morning, three barbers, Charles Le Clerque, H. St. Louis and T. D. Dorrell, were each fined the costs of the court for keeping their shops open on Good Friday, contrary to the bylaw. The magistrate pointed out that the bylaw had been passed at the request of the barbers themselves and that it was the duty of the police to see that it was lived up to.

### RAILROAD SITUATION

The wedding forms a chapter in a war romance, the happy couple having met each other in London while Mr. Biddle was over there.

### DRYDOCK

At the city council last night, a letter from Sir Robert Borden was read, in reply to the mayor's letter enclosing the drydock resolution. The premier said that he would discuss the matter with his colleagues at the earliest opportunity.

The reply from E. J. Chamberlain, which was published a few days ago, was also read.

In regard to the letter, Ald. Montgomery said he thought that this communication knocked the bottom out of the city for the near future. The G. T. P. simply holds its hands up and says that it is unable to do anything with this plant which cost millions. He thought the matter should be referred to a committee of citizens. He felt that the state of affairs was serious. Ald. McClymont seconded the motion, which carried.

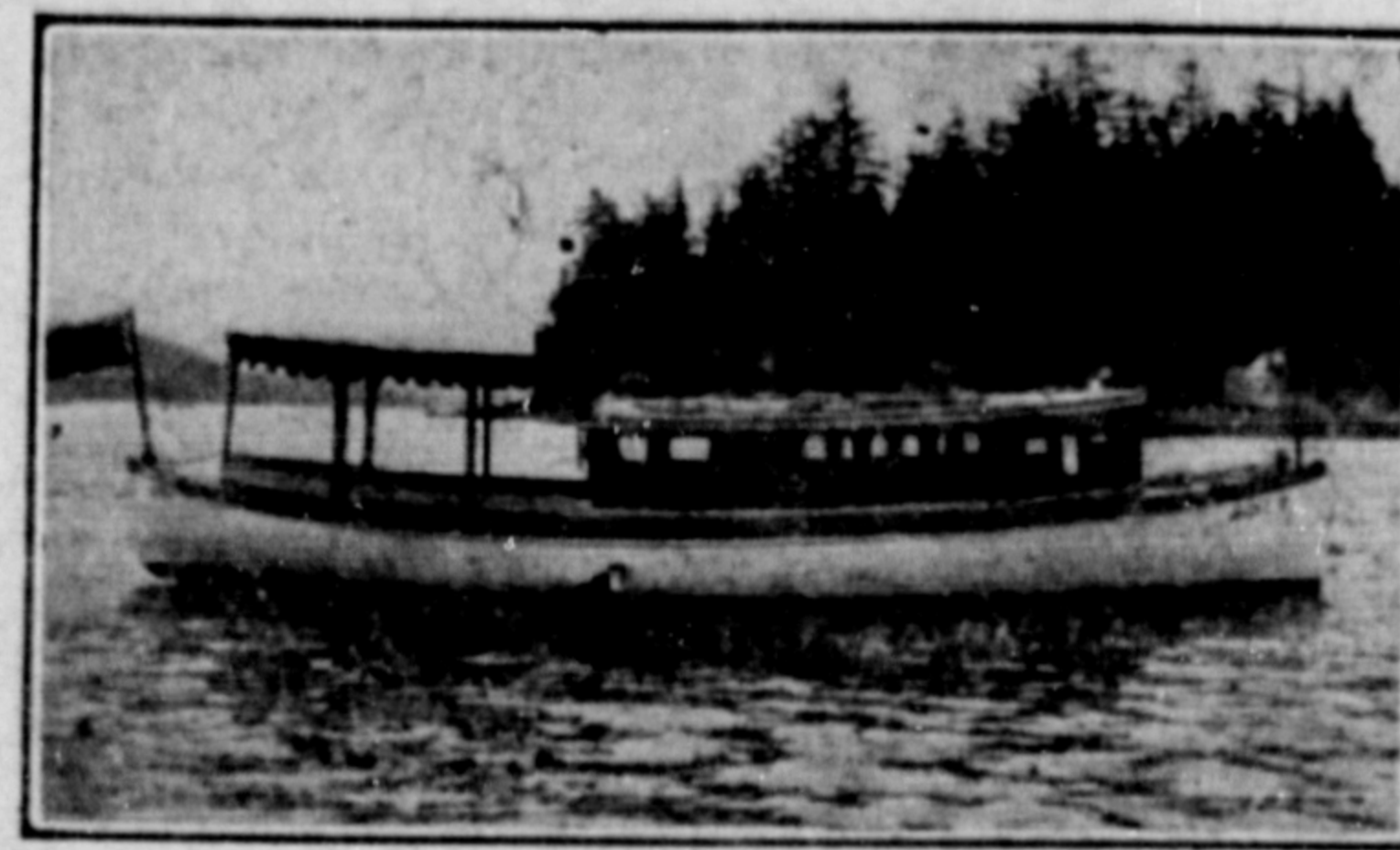
