MYSTERIOUS DELAY ABOUT THE EXTENSION

The Toronto Globe publishes the following special despatch from Ottawa: Although the extension of the life of Parliament was made the first business of the session, and the government claimed at the beginning of the session that the petition to the Imperial Parliament must be attended to at once, even before war business came up, there seems to have been mysterious delay either in sending the petition to London or in getting action by the British House. At any rate, Sir George Foster, who was leading the House this afternoon in the absence of Sir Robert Borden, confessed when questioned by Hon. George P. Graham that he did not know what had happened to the petition.

Mr. Graham asked for some information as to whether the term of Parliament had really been extended or not, and what information the government could give as to whether the petition had been sent or whether it had been acted upon. The petition was passed in the Commons on February 8th.

Sir George replied that he did not know what the situation was. Only the Prime Minister could tell and he was absent.

Meanwhile there is considerable speculation as to the reasons for the delay in the final step in securing the extension of the life of Parliament until October, 1917. It is not beyond the bounds of possibility that after all there might be an election this year.
