C. N. R. BONDS
 In reply to H. C. Brewster, in regard to Sir Thos. White's statement that the Provincial and Federal governments would have to meet \$4,500,000 interest on C. N. R. bonds, Premier Bowser stated that Sir William McKenzie informed him that the Canadian Northern would be able to meet its interest charges this year. Sir Thomas White made his statement that they would not, at a time when Sir William McKenzie was very busy in Ottawa laying plans for the securing of a further fifteen millions, and it may be taken that the Federal Minister of Finance did not make the statement merely to have the satisfaction of saying something which Mr. Bowser would have to contradict. Sir Thomas White must have been very certain of his facts before he made any such statement, as he is not given to distributing bad news just for the fun of the thing.

The second portion of Mr. Bowser's reply contained an "if" which took away a good deal of the stamina from his first assertion, but he sought to strengthen it by claiming that, in any case, the province was perfectly safe, as it could take over the British Columbia section of the road, under its trust deed. Anyone who knows anything about railroads in general, and the mountain section of the C. N. R. in particular, will be able to figure out just how much of an asset this would be to the province. The only safe bet about the British Columbia section of the C. N. R. is that the province will have to meet its guarantees as Sir Thomas White stated.

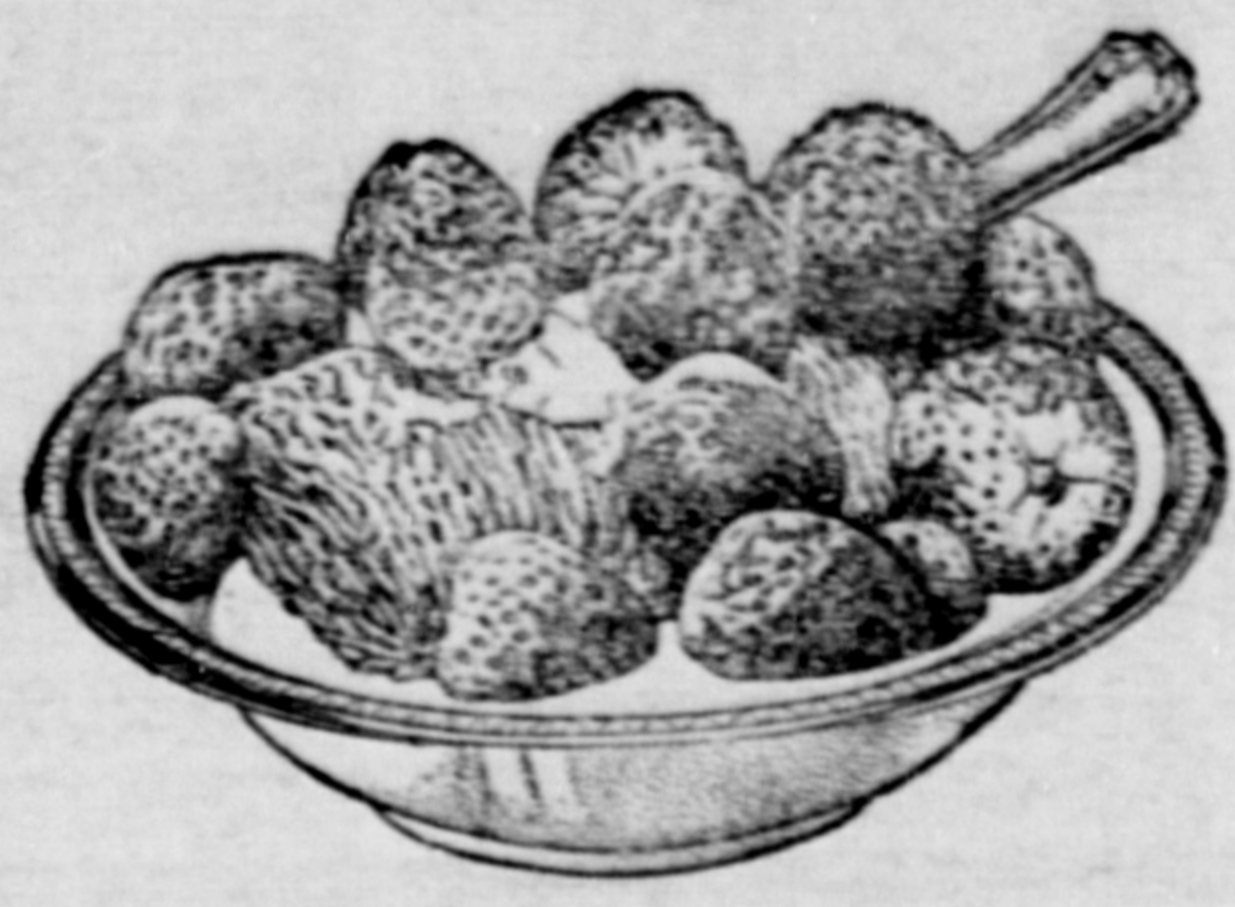
