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SAM'S ADVICE

In an interview with a representative of the Ottawa Journal in regard to the recent heavy losses at Ypres Sir Sam Hughes said that had he remained in England, instead of having to return to Canada to face his accusers, he believed he would have succeeded in convincing Kitchener that he should abandon the Ypres salient and, Sam adds, "the bloody battles of the last few days, with their loss of our best and bravest, would have been avoided."

Could anything more clearly show the size of Sam Hughes. Imagine any man calling himself a soldier making such a statement for publication, or otherwise. Even though the assertion were absolutely true, what possible excuse is there for Sir Sam's making it, except that he may try to make a little personal or party capital out of the losses on the Canadian portion of the western front.

It is interesting to compare the attitude of Sam Hughes with that of Lord Roberts, not that there is the slightest resemblance between the two men, but that they may be contrasted. For years before the war, Lord Roberts preached in the House, and out of it, the doctrine of compulsory military training, in view of the German menace. He warned the nation times without number of what was bound to happen. His warning was passed unheeded, and he lived to see his forecast of events fulfilled to the utmost.

Did Lord Roberts sit down and holler "I told you so?" Veteran though he was, he set to work to do his share, but no man ever heard him mention the fact that he had ever dreamt of such a thing as this great war, though he had described minutely just what would happen, on many scores of occasions. Roberts was a

real soldier; said nothing, and did nobly what he could.

Had the situation at present not been tragic, this phase of the Hughes' character would provide endless matter for the comic papers, but it is too grave a matter to joke over now, though the idea of a man of the calibre of Sam Hughes advising Kitchener as to his plan of campaign is too funny for words.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Now that the Russians command the railroad centre to Kovel, Brest and southward there are prospects of still more rapid progress against the Austrians in the immediate future. It looks as if Russia is to solve the Verdun problem by forcing the Germans to use all their energy in the east.

It now appears that there was only one man on the jury in the Gosden case who stood out for acquittal and that the first telegraphic report that the jury had "lined-up nine to three" was wrong. The foreman of the jury complained bitterly of the attitude of this one dissenter who refused to be moved by any argument or piece of evidence.

The Victoria Colonist says that in the election campaign the Opposition will be on their defence. This will be the Bowser attitude no doubt, but the public cannot forget that it was the Bowser-McBride bunch which handed the \$75,000 to Joe Matson; who put through the illegal Kitsilano deal by which Read and his partner made \$80,000; who handed out the contracts for the Parliament Buildings, with the assistance of Harry Price and Gompny, and did a thousand and one things which no self-respecting government would ever have attempted.

Bowser is squirming under the action of H. C. Brewster, but the onus for the whole business is on Bowser. If he carried on the government legally, he has nothing to fear; if he did not, he must pay the price.

of debentures were handed over to them for which the city is to pay them \$800.00 per year for their services in connection therewith. In addition we have to pay their attorney's charges for passing upon the agreement. This agreement gives the purchaser the right to surrender the temporary notes to the bank and take up debentures therefor at any interest bearing date, upon call being made 30 days prior to such date. Instructions have been given and acknowledgement made by the bank as to their understanding the terms. At the same time, Spitzer, Rorick draw upon the \$60,000.00 deposit, \$75.00 for each \$1,000.00 bond taken up, being additional discount due as hereinbefore set out. This was done to facilitate the exchange and save accrued interest during such exchange.

In addition to carrying out these details in the interest of the
