MACHINE OIL

F. W. Welsh, one of the candidates on the original Tory Vancouver ticket who was withdrawn after the Sullivan affair, has got into another mess. The Bowser machine has always required a plentiful supply of oil and it has been an open secret for long that the general public of the province provided most of that commodity though it was, of course, obtained by painless extraction.

The enquiry conducted by Mr. Justice Murphy into contracts procured from the Vancouver School Board sheds some interesting light upon the Tory methods of extraction. J. C. Pendray, a soap manufacturer of Victoria, wanted to secure a contract for soap from the board, and F. W. Welsh, a member of the board and president of the local Conservative Association, made it abundantly plain that a contribution to the Tory machine would not be unwelcome, to put the matter gently. Mr. Pendray came through with \$25, but, to make sure that he did not come out on the wrong side, he added that amount to the contract price. In other words, the School Board, or rather the taxpayers of Vancouver, contributed that \$25 to the Bowser fund.

Mr. Welsh has been so prominent lately that he has been dropped from the Tory ticket, though he shows an inclination not to stay out. He is the gentleman who was on such intimate terms with John L. Sullivan and the Tory election gang from Seattle that Johnny sent him two wireless messages describing the oncoming voters in order that he might recognize them when they met. It was this Mr. Welsh who experienced such convenient lapses of memory when the "plugging" enquiry was on and also showed a great aptitude for destroying incriminating letters.

This friend of Sullivan, and the other jail-birds, who man-

aged to squeeze \$25 out of the soap manufacturer, or rather out of the people of Vancouver, for the Tory funds in return for a contract for soap is one of the crew who tried their utmost to blackguard M. A. Macdonald. He is now measuring down to his true standard and M. A. Macdonald still measures up to his full six feet some odd inches and looks the world in the face. It is the irony of fate that the first disclosures in connection with the school board form of Tory graft should be linked up with a contract for an article so cleansing as Pendray's soap.

The evidence in the enquiry makes amusing reading, especially as the counsel for the Tories seems to have labored under the delusion that it was a parliamentary enquiry that was being conducted. Mr. McNeill objected strenuously to the directness of the questions put, but Justice Murphy quietly told him just where he got off. Some day the story of the Seattle pluggers will be revealed just as clearly as the little soap deal was on Monday, but the revelation will not take place before a Tory parliamentary committee. There will not be such a thing as the latter in British Columbia for many years.
