RUSSIANS PRESSING CLOSER ON LEMBERG

DEUTSCHLAND PUTS TO SEA — FIVE HUNDRED CASUALTIES IN NEW ONTARIO

LEMBERG WILL BE ISOLATED BY RUSSIANS

Brussiloff Plans to cut off Kovel and Vladimir-Volynski from Lemberg — Austrian Collapse Likely.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 2.—General Brussiloff's strategy isolates the Germans and Austrians who are holding Kovel and Vladimir-Volynski. The Russian army is pressing closer to Lemberg from Brody and it is believed that it will compel a separation of the Austro-German armies. Military observers assert that, if Brussiloff can carry out his present plans, the result will be the complete demoralization and collapse of the Austrians who, even with German assistance, cannot hope to successfully oppose such a move.

Heavy Fighting.

A severe battle is raging on the western portion of the Russian front in the vicinity of the villages of Stoysova and Smolary. The Russians have inflicted heavy losses upon the enemy and have repulsed every German advance.

GERMANS FAIL BEFORE FRENCH MACHINE GUNS

German Trench Captured—Fierce Attacks Repulsed—Deutschland Sails—Cruisers Waiting.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, August 2.—South of the Somme the French have captured a German trench near Estrees. The Germans last night violently bombarded the French positions at Thiaumont and reached the French trenches but were compelled to retreat in face of a terrific barrage of machine gun fire.

It is estimated that the Germans have two million men on the western front. Many of the prisoners recently captured were boys of nineteen years of age.

Deutschland Departs.

Baltimore, August 2.—The German submarine Deutschland has departed. She must pass through a cordon of eight waiting Entente men-of-war. It is impossible that she can cut underneath them on account of the shallow water off Cape Henry. She must cross a heavy sand bar at that point, which, at the best, cannot give her more than sixty fathoms of water.

East Africa.

London, August 2.—British troops in German East Africa have again assumed the offensive, while the Belgian forces are also making progress. The port of Pangania has been captured and the booty includes four thousand head of cattle.

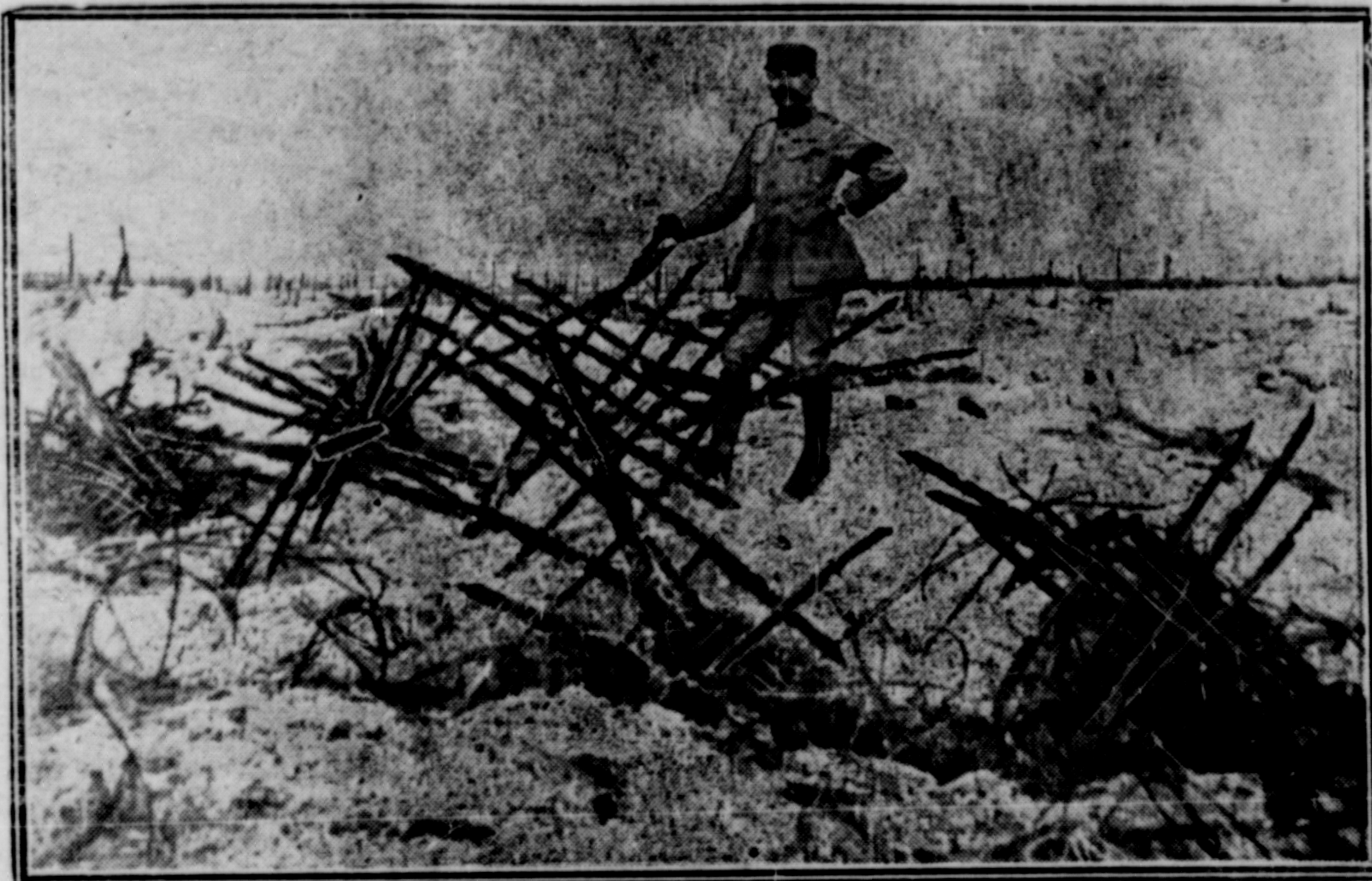
DOUBLE FEATURE AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

At the gathering of citizens in the Westholme Theatre on Friday evening, August 4th, the following resolution will be put:

"RESOLVED: That on this, the second anniversary of the declaration of a righteous war, the citizens of Prince Rupert record their inflexible determination to continue to a victorious end the struggle in maintenance of those ideals of liberty and justice which are the common and sacred cause of the Allies."

As has been said before, the gathering is in no sense a celebration, but is simply the making of a renewal of the solemn vow taken by the citizens of the British Empire one year ago. All citizens are invited to join the parade at the city hall at 7:30 on Friday evening and to march in a body to the theatre.

None in our midst has made greater sacrifices for the Empire in this war than have been made by Mr. and Mrs. Peters and their family. RE B. C. PROHIBITION ACT

WILL IT RESTRICT?

READ THIS "WIDE OPEN" CLAUSE OF THE ACT Section 57, Par. 2:

"Nothing in this Act shall be construed to interfere (a) With the right of any person to import from without the Province liquor for bona fide use in his private dwelling house.

Does not this clause provide for free and unrestricted importation of liquor with out (1) control by the Government, (2) Limitation as to the amount which may be ordered, (3) Restriction as to frequency of orders. NOTE:—The prohibition legislation of Washington and Oregon allows liquor to be imported only under permits issued by the county authorities, the amount on each permit being limited to 2 qts. of spirits or 12 qts. of beer with only one permit to any individual every 20 days in Washington and every 28 days in Oregon. Despite these restrictions, Prohibitionists in both states say that the provisions for importing liquor are so broad as to make the legislation of no real value.

CAPTAIN DE MUSSEY KILLED AT VERDUN

Captain F. G. de Mussey was killed in front of Verdun on May 22nd. The sad news was conveyed to F. W. Doherty, manager of the Royal Bank, in a letter from Mrs. de Mussey. Captain de Mussey, who resided here for several years and was in partnership with H. A. Philpott, left for his native France immediately on the outbreak of the war, Mrs. de Mussey accompanying him. The captain saw much of the desperate fighting in the early stages of the war and at intervals cheery reports were received by friends in town. It will be with the greatest regret that citizens will hear of the gallant captain's death and the heartfelt sympathy of all will go out to Mrs. de Mussey in her bereavement.

FIVE HUNDRED LIVES LOST IN TERRIBLE FIRE

Settlers Died Trying to Save Their Homes and Effects—Many Charred Bodies are Recovered.

Haileybury, Ont., August 2.—Though it is impossible to determine the exact loss of life resulting from the recent bush fires in New Ontario, it is expected that the casualties will reach five hundred. Relief parties from North Bay, Haileybury, Cobalt and Liskeard are searching for bodies and one hundred and thirty were recovered from one trench. They were badly charred and it is almost impossible to identify them. So fierce was the fire that the town of Matheson was entirely consumed in twenty minutes.

Settlers' Sacrifice.

Ottawa, August 2.—The over-anxiety of settlers to save their homes and personal effects was responsible for the exceptional number of deaths at Cochrane in the recent holocaust, according to the opinion of prominent railroad contractors who are familiar with Northern Ontario conditions.

THIRTY CARLOADS OF COPPER ARRIVED

The steamer Amur, which was recently purchased by the Griffiths Company for the Granby copper trade, arrived today from Anyox with thirty carloads of copper mat for shipment east. This precious metal has been arriving in single carloads up to the present and this will be the first occasion on which a whole train load of copper has gone east over the G. T. P.
