## HALF-HOLIDAY CHANGED TO WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The retail merchants of the city met last evening in the city hall to discuss the half-holiday question, Thomas McMeekin presiding over an attendance of about twenty-five. There was a general discussion, the general opinion being that Saturday had proven to be a very inconvenient day to close, for various reasons. Finally, J. G. Scott, seconded by Mrs. Frizzell, moved that Wednesday be adopted as the half-holiday. This was supported by all except two merchants. On the motion of H. S. Wallace, seconded by Mr. Smith, of the Bazaar, it was decided to have a committee interview the merchants not present at the meeting in order to have their consent to Wednesday closing.

J. G. Scott raised the question of a closing hour for Saturdays, and Mr. Smith, seconded by R. A. Grant, moved that 9:30 be fixed for closing on Saturday evenings. George Frizzell, seconded by D. C. McRae, moved an amendment that 10 o'clock be the closing hour. The amendment carried and was made unanimous.

The question of drug stores selling other goods than drugs after 6:30 p. m. was also brought up. D. C. McRae said that the city solicitor had notified them of the change of law on this point and he believed that they would live up to the act.

## HALIBUT ARRIVALS

Now that the strike is over, American halibut schooners are arriving steadily. This morning, the Elsie had 14,000; Dora H., 11,000; Albatross, 25,000; Elizabeth, 15,000, and Equator, 5,000. Late last night the Vansee brought in 40,000 which was sold to the Gold Storage Company, and the Chief Zibassa had 40,000 for the company.
