

VON MACKENZEN TAKES COMMAND OF GERMAN ARMY

All Available Guns and men to be Rushed to Somme-Terrible Losses of Enemy on Eastern Front.

Paris, Aug. 19 .- Field Marshal Von Mackenzen is now in supreme command of Germany's armies with the exception of the Crown Prince's forces at Verdun. He has ordered all reserves in the training camps and all available artillery to be rushed to the Somme front in an effort to stop the Anglo-French offensive.
