"BOWSERISM"

The Victoria Colonist has for some time past been trying to prove that there is no such thing as Bowserism. Throughout the province of British Columbia the system of misgovernment inaugurated and carried on by Bowser and his machine is known to every elector by the name of Bowserism, and, one ventures to think that, had Bowserism been the name given to something which was good and worthy of recognition the Colonist would have been proud to use the term and doubtless would now be using it in large type and frequently.

Had Bowserism represented the opening up of the farming lands of British Columbia to the settler and the forming of community settlements with schools, churches and all the usual social institutions, the Bowser press would not be ashamed of the name.

Had Bowserism stood for fair and equitable dealing between the Canadian Northern Railway Company and the people, and between the Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company and the people, the Colonist would today be heralding Bowserism as a force for good.

Had Bowser told the members of the private bills committee that he could not sanction the passing of the act enabling the Dominion Trust Co. to accept deposits, contrary to the law of the Dominion, and had thus prevented the working people of this province from losing their hard-earned savings through the defaulting of that infamous institution, Bowserism would be proclaimed from the housetops as all that is good, sound and sane in legislation.

In short, had Bowser conducted the business of this province as he would conduct his own business; had Bowser carried on the affairs of the province in the interests of the people, instead of in the interests of his political friends; had Bowser recognized the

fact that, as attorney-general and as premier, he is the servant of the province and not an emperor whose privilege is to crush to death all who differ with him, the Colonist would not today be trying to prove that there is no such thing as Bowserism, but would be trying to show that Bowserism is the greatest "ism" that ever was.

The Colonist is trying to prove that there is no such thing as Bowserism because it knows full well that Bowserism is something to be thoroughly ashamed of. It knows that Bowserism is inherently evil; that it is the antithesis of democratic government; that it is opposed to all freedom of thought on the part of the individual, and that its only form of government is the whip for the small man and financial accommodation for the railroad magnate. Bowserism knows no law except the political expediency of the moment and its every move is estimated at its value in votes and not according to the welfare of the province. Bowserism will die on September 14th and then the contention of the Colonist that there is no such thing as Bowserism will actually be true.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

A. R. Mallory, who is a pretty shrewd judge of conditions on the Islands, states most emphatically that T. D. Pattullo will receive seventy-five per cent of the vote polled over there. parts of said park being closed to the public because the approaches are in the hands of speculators.

Many parts of the alleged roads on the Queen Charlotte Islands have cost this province \$10,000 per mile and then they are unfit to drive a team over. William Manson is personally responsible for this waste of money and retarded development.

The Bowser press asserts that there was no jobbery in connection with the Parliament Buildings contracts. How does it account for the fact that G. A. Fraser, a Victoria druggist, received \$1.00 per yard for removing the top soil from the site for this building and for piling it up a few yards away; 30 cents a yard would have been a fair price for the work.

spots of the Islands, the same dissatisfaction with Bowserism and with William Manson, was met with, and at Queen Charlotte City, the finest meeting of the tour was held. Many questions were asked, showing the interest the people are taking in the issues before them, and Mr. Pattullo's answers were thoroughly convincing. Robert Leighton moved a vote of confidence which was carried in "overwhelming fashion, there being but two or three dissenting, each of those being men who have fed from the Bowser hand. The tour closed with meetings at Lockport and Jedway, the candidate being assured of a big majority there as elsewhere. Mr. Mallory says that it is in no sense an ordinary party fight on the Islands. The thinking Conservatives over there are just as anxious to see Bowserism defeated as are the Liberals.

In this, the Islanders are not peculiar, as the same condition prevails throughout the province.
