KAISER HAS DISMISSED VON FALKENHAYN

VON HINDENBURG TAKES COMMAND--RUMANIAN MOVE COSTS GERMANY DEAR

HINDENBURG SUPERSEDES FALKENHAYN

Chief of German General Staff is Dismissed—Iron Crosses Galore—Britain Wants Leather.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, Aug. 30.—The Kaiser has appointed Field Marshal Von Hindenburg as Chief of the General Staff in succession to General Von Falkenhayn, who has been dismissed.

Von Hindenburg was responsible for the breaking up of the first great Russian offensive and for the driving of the Russian forces back on the eastern front. During the winter, he held the Riga front, but was recently superseded by the Archduke Frederick.

Von Falkenhayn succeeded Von Kluck, and has had control of the western front for over a year, with the exception of the attack on Verdun which was left in the hands of the Crown Prince and his staff.

Iron Crosses.

Copenhagen, August 30.—The Kiel Zeitung announces that, since the commencement of hostilities, Germany has distributed four hundred and thirty thousand Iron Crosses.

Canadian Leather Wanted.

London, Aug. 30.—Great Britain, under the Defense of the Realm Act, is requiring that all Canada's available leather supply be shipped to Britain and none of it to foreign countries.

U. S. CRUISER MEMPHIS LOST IN WEST INDIES

Santa Domingo, West Indies, August 30.—The United States armored cruiser Memphis struck a rock and grounded in the outer harbor and is expected to become a total loss. It is believed that a percentage of her crew of nine hundred and ninety perished.

The Toronto Globe of August 24th says editorially "It would be a crime, the ghastliest and most murderous crime of the war, no matter what the excuse or what the cause, were General Sir Sam Hughes given a real command of living soldiers in a genuine engagement anywhere on the war's battlefield."

"The thing—even the thought of such a thing—suggested in yesterday's despatches from Ottawa, is so monstrous that the man in the street would scout offhand the suggestion were it not for the fear that, judging from the experiences of the past two years, the thing might be true. And if true, then God have mercy on the officers and men doomed to service in that command.

"His limelight posturings in Canada, in England, and in France are Canada's humiliation; but, facing a German charge, limelight for General Hughes would be the blackness of darkness for his men condemned 'to do and die.'

If the Prime Minister has no other way by which the country can be rid of Sir Sam Hughes, let the Canadians at home endure the affliction to its worst rather than imperil the lives of Canadians at the front by an army command as the price of his resignation."

REPUBLICANS WOULD BRING WAR, SAYS REID

STRIKE SITUATION BECOMES CRITICAL

Washington, August 30.—The executive of the railroad men announces that a general railway strike will become effective at seven o'clock on the morning of Labor Day unless the demand of the men for an eight-hour day is granted.

Serious Situation.

New York, Aug. 30.—Provided the railway strike becomes effective, seven million residents of this city would face starvation in a fortnight. If the operation of food trains were suspended, the situation would rapidly become very serious. The milk supply would be consumed in twenty-four hours; the available flour supply would last only one week; meat would give out in ten days, and general groceries would be used up in three weeks.

Railroad Embargo.

Chicago, August 30.—Several western railways have placed an embargo on all perishable freight to become effective on September sixth.

HEAVY DEATH CLAIMS

London, Ont., Aug. 30.—The Ancient Order of United Workmen, on account of the settlement of three quarters of a million dollars in death claims, has revised its policy of valuations, transferring the financial burden to members exceeding twenty years standing.

CANADIAN SOLDIERS DON'T LIKE SIR SAM

Toronto, Aug. 26.—The Toronto Star (Liberal) prints a special cable from its London correspondent today regarding the alleged attitude of the troops towards the minister of militia who has just returned to London from a visit to the Canadians in France. The despatch says:

"A shrewd and experienced observer who has unusual facilities for ascertaining the views of the Canadian troops here, declares that if there were a federal election tomorrow with the soldiers voting, nine out of ten of them would vote against Sir Sam Hughes. My own experience at the front recently supports this contention. The feeling throughout the army is strongly against Sir Sam. Officers and men alike have come to me praising articles published in Canadian papers criticizing him.

"The criticism here rests on several counts. There is much complaint about the wasteful equipment which was supplied to the men in Canada only to be scrapped as soon as they arrive here. It is felt, too, that too many men closely associated with Sir Sam, or related to him, have been given high commands, while conversely, men of opposite political views have been kept back for no apparent reason. RUMANIAN MOVE IS BITTER BLOW TO THE GERMANS

Germany will Lose Immense Quantities of Supplies—Bulgaria's Fate—Greeks made Big Mistake.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Aug. 30.—Roumania's decision to enter the war on the side of the Allies has caused consternation in Germany and the countries of her allies. The Roumanian move means to Germany the sacrifice of the receipt of tremendous quantities of supplies and the necessity of extending her lines of defence.

Germany had arranged for the taking over of the entire wheat surplus in Roumania and for supplies of rolling stock, hides, etc.

Austrian monitors have bombarded the Roumanian coast towns of Verciorova, Turnu, Severin and Giurgevo.

Bulgaria's Fate.

Paris, Aug. 30.—The feeling is prevalent that Bulgaria will cease to exist as a state after the war.

Greek Mistake.

Athens, Aug. 30.—Fifty thousand Greeks, realizing the mistake made by the government and King Constantine in showing sympathy with the cause of Germany and Austria, paraded in front of the residence of ex-premier Venizelos, who has firmly favored the Allies, imploring him to give assistance to the people and to urge the King to join the Entente Allies in the war.
