"PEACE ON EARTH, GOOD WILL AMONG MEN"

After twenty centuries—twenty centuries of bloodshed and the arbitrage of the sword—it looks as if the song of the angels is to be realized. Nations, like individuals are strongly moved by the power of a good example. The Guildhall meeting described in our cable despatches on Saturday, when Premier Asquith moved and Mr. Arthur Balfour, the leader of the British Opposition, seconded, a resolution favoring arbitration with the United States, is one of the most significant advances since the Magna Charta. It is the token of a new day in the history of nations, when disputes shall be ended by peace instead of by war. The acceptance of the proposed treaty by both governments is a foregone conclusion now.

There is, however, the information that the negotiations between France and the United States for the conclusion of an arbitration treaty are quite as far advanced as the negotiations between Great Britain and the United States. The arbitration treaty in view between France and the United States provides for arbitration in all cases including those in which the honor of the contracting parties may be at stake. It provides for what is known technically as "arbitration integrale," in other words, for compulsory arbitration, so that if France and the United States were ever involved in a dispute they would be subject to the necessity of submitting it to a tribunal. In this respect, the projected Franco-American treaty resembles, of course, the treaty in view between Great Britain and the United States.

After the conclusion of the Anglo-American and the Franco-American arbitration treaties respectively there will probably be an arbitration treaty between Great Britain and France on identical lines. This would mean that Great Britain, France and the United States would be bound together in a triple league of peace.

That the league of peace cannot stop here is obvious. Germany already perceives this. Indeed the war-party in Germany is using the treaty as a text, by pointing out that the triple league of peace may desire to impose the arbitration principle upon the remainder of the world by force. This is not an unreasonable deduction, for as long as great powers like Japan, Russia, Austria and Germany maintain huge armies and navies, the league of peace cannot run the risk of reducing their armaments. And the fact must be patent to everyone, that it is not so much the angels' song that is at the bottom of the desire for peace, as the rigid consequences of economic law; that it is not idealism, but the burden of taxation that is compelling the nations to the better way.

The Conservative party in Germany regards the idea of compulsory arbitration with something approaching very nearly to abhorrence. Patriotic Germans consider it unreasonable and intolerable that great national issues involving the honor of the whole German people should compulsorily be submitted to an international tribunal. There is a conviction that in the present condition of international politics, there must certainly be many questions on which no self-respecting nation could consent to take the verdict of foreigners, but must be determined to have its own way, even at the cost of war.

The views held in Berlin are shared in Vienna and St. Petersburg. Russia, for instance, it is pointed out, has adjacent frontiers with the race that personifies the future of the Yellow Peril, and even if there were a league of peace in Europe and America, the Russians would not venture to disarm or in any way to undermine their position in front of the hordes of yellow men who would rush westward as a devastating torrent the moment the barriers of European armament removed were or even weakened. On the other hand there is a rapidly growing Radical and Socialist party in Germany, with some fifty members in the Reichstag. It is to the growth of this party of international rather than national ideals, that the peace movement looks to in Germany.

The Millenium is not to be accomplished save by slow and painful steps. The consummation and successful working of the hoped for triple league of peace between France, the United States and Great Britain will do much to help the peace party in Germany in their difficult task of convincing the German nation that the peace movement means her no harm.

EXPERTS ARE COMING HERE

Government Sending Agricultural Experts Through B. C.

WILL ADDRESS FARMERS

Messrs. Wier and White are

Two Agricultural and Horticultural Specialists From Ontario—Every Possibility of Land Will be Noted and Reported Made.

To look over the agricultural

possibilities of Northern B. C., to

address meetings of farmers on

educational subjects, to learn everything about the soil for

horticultural pursuits will be the chief

objects of the visit of Messrs. E. A. Wier, an expert agriculturalist

and horticulturist from Ontario, and E. W. White, a son of Rev. Silva White of New Westminster,

who have been specially commissioned by the Provincial Department of Agriculture to tour the country between here and Hazelton via the valleys of the Naas and Skeena rivers, and especially investigate the agricultural and horticultural possibilities of that region.

Going via Hazelton

Messrs. Wier and White will

thoroughly explore the entire coast

and adjacent northern territory,

travelling on horseback and by

canoe, and making daily memoranda of the areas explored, the

character of the soil, the maximum, average and lowest

temperature, frost conditions, precipitation, extent and character

of timber, approximate cost of clearing, etc., etc., mailing these memoranda back to the Department

at Victoria at every opportunity, in the same manner that similar

reports will be made in future by all Provincial surveys engaged in the field.

Both Mr. Wier and Mr. White

are spoken of as exceptionally

capable men, with thorough, practical knowledge of agriculture

and all its related industries. They intend going in by way of Hazelton, to spend the entire season in the north country and to complete an agricultural survey of the whole of northern British Columbia in so far as possible. From the data which they will collect during the season, a full and completely informative report will be made with respect to the producing capabilities of the several districts; at the same time, these two expert representatives of the Department will hold conferences with the farmers and settlers at every opportunity, advising them as to what crops or fruits their lands are most suited for, and the methods to be adopted for the securing of the best possible results.

Taking Seeds

Messrs. Wier and White are

also taking with them a quantity

of sugar beet seed, and extensive

experiments will be conducted with a view to testing the suitability

of the northern district for this particular crop and the related

industry of sugar-making.
