WILLIAM FAILED

We regret that the local Bowser organ, by accusing us of misrepresentation, has forced us to again refer to the feeble way in which Hon. Wm. Manson has acted as representative of Prince Rupert.

Many lots in this city, from which the provincial government drew a huge sum in cash at the original auction, have reverted to the government.

Hon. William Manson knew, or ought to have known, this. The municipality of Point Grey was in a similar position and applied to the government for payment of arrears of taxes.

Hon. William Manson was a member of the Executive Council when the agreement was entered into with Point Grey, in fact, was chairman of the council.

Hon. William Manson, knowing that Prince Rupert was in a similar plight and was receiving no redress, made no effort to get the same arrangement made for this city.

In plain language, Hon. Wm. Manson was so little interested in his own constituency that he made no attempt to secure for it what he had already helped to give Point Grey. The

explanation may be that Point Grey is in the south and that Prince Rupert is in the north and that the majority of the council are from the south, but the fact remains that William did nothing, when he could have done much, even in sending a postcard to the city council.

Will The Journal inform the people of Prince Rupert just exactly wherein there is the slightest word of misrepresentation in this statement of fact?

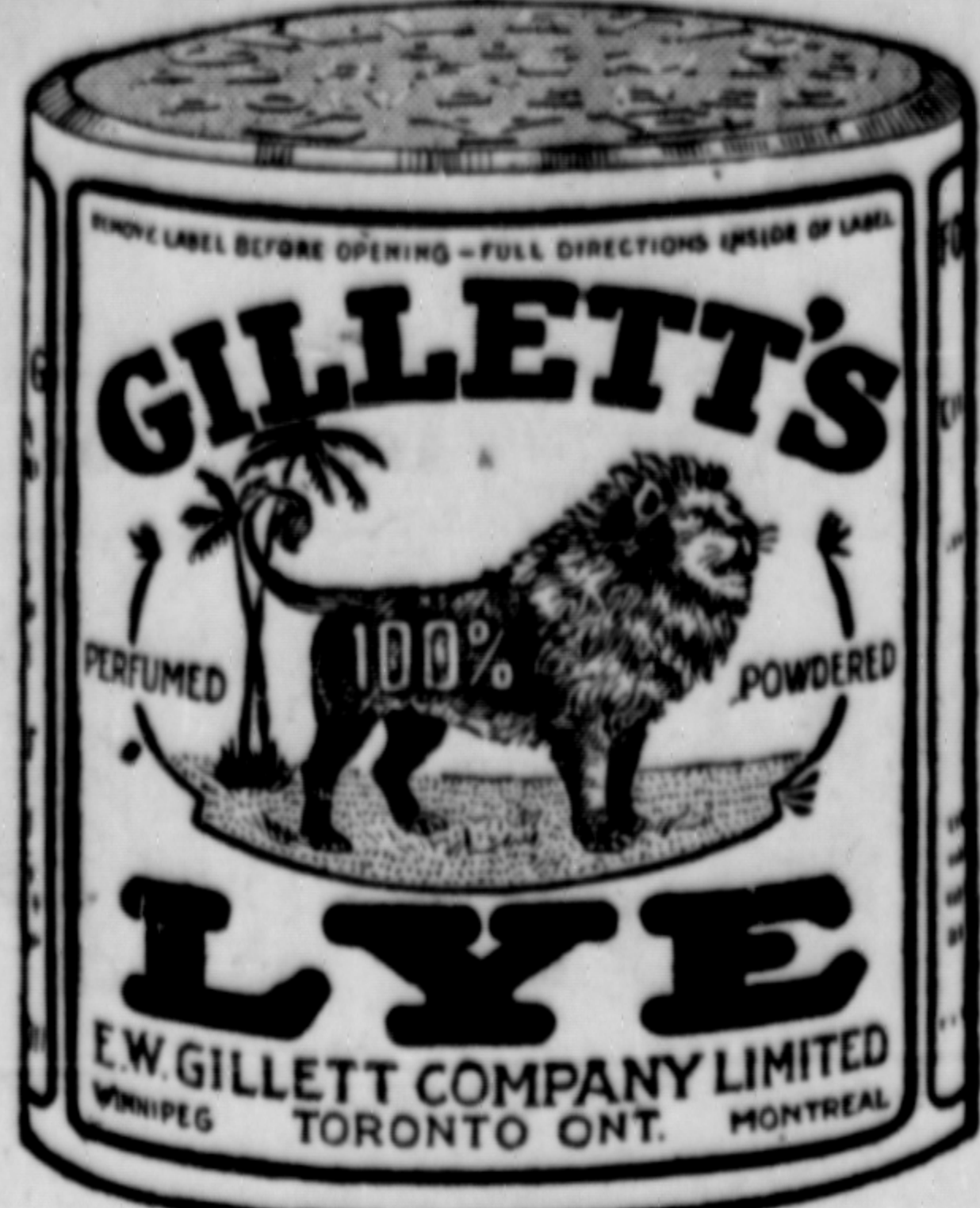

act will not close the hotels, but we contend that this act will introduce bottle drinking, and also keg drinking of strong liquors, which is the worst form of drinking. How any man can defend drinking in the homes, in the shacks, in apartment houses, in dwelling houses of every description and in every locality as being preferable to the present system, does not seem sound argument.

If his Lordship and all other Prohibition people want to wipe out the liquor traffic, why did they not demand and insist on getting legislation that would do so, as was within their power.

Read what Mr. Brewster, leader of the Liberal party, said on the floor of the House about this act:

"I am surprised, indeed, that the Prohibition people have not taken advantage of the favorable position they now occupy, and submit an act that will effectually prohibit. There are many features of this legislation, not in the best interests of our people. As an example I refer to the burden of proof which should not be on the accused, as in this act, because this is wrong and an un-British principle."

"I am surprised that we are not asked to pass an act that will actually prohibit; that is, that advantage has not been taken of the Dominion legislation giving power to the province to prohibit the possession of liquor."

Read what Mr. Parker Williams leader of the Socialist party, said on the floor of the House, about this act.

Mr. Parker Williams, member for Newcastle, when discussing the act in committee criticised the measure severely. Speaking from the workingman's standpoint, he declared the act to be class legislation of the rankest type, and said that the bill was not a Prohibition measure in any particular. The words of Mr. Williams, in this connection (in part) were as follows:

"It would look as if this act was intended to remove the temptation of drink from wage earners by indirect methods, and is, therefore, another example of class legislation, the intention being that the workingman will
