REVOLUTION

Revolutions are the direct outcome of unjust rule; by the few usurping the rights of the many. Most of the great revolutions of history have been brought about by the actions of some profligate king and his courtiers, who have spent the substance of the people; have looted the public treasury to feed those who fawned upon them, and have brought their countries to the verge of ruin, until the people rose up in their wrath and overthrew them, usually with terrible bloodshed on both sides. Outside of Mexico, where a state of revolution might be said to have become chronic, simply because the state of government has become chronically wretched, the most recent revolution of any importance was that which drenched France in the blood of her sons. Space forbids going into the matter in detail but all are familiar with the misrule of the Bourbons which was the root of the French revolution. The people stood for the spending of the wealth of the country in profligacy for years, but, at last, they rose, and their rising was as of a turbulent sea which swept all before it.

Today, we live in a more democratic age, when, particularly in the British Empire, the people are supposed to rule, by electing their representatives at stated intervals to carry on the government of the country. Even in a democratic country, governments have been known to become so obsessed with their power as to forget that they are the servants of the people and not rulers by Divine Right, as the ancient kings claimed to be. A revolution in a democratic country is just as likely to happen as in an autocracy, only it takes a different form. The people are imbued with the principles of constitutional government and they abide by those principles. When a rev-

olution breaks out they use ballots instead of bullets, but the result is the same in the one great essential, in that they rid themselves of the government which has ruled for the few instead of for the many.

British Columbia today is in a state of revolt, just as surely as France was last century. There will be no bloodshed, nevertheless this province is simply seething with revolt against a government which has spent the substance of the people in riotous living, just as surely as did the Bourbons. Instead of Louis, we have Bowser, and instead of the stately courtiers we have MacKenzie and Mann, J. W. Stewart and Pat Welch, while the directors of the Dominion Trust are not far distant. The few have grabbed the soil, not that they may produce food for the people but that they may extract huge profits from those who would produce food; the mining camps have been turned into minor little kingdoms, which are a farce in a country claiming to be democratic, while even amongst the people, there are the supporters of the king drawing freely on the public purse without any attempt at production, while those who are not tied to the court are discriminated against and denied even their freedom, though they pay their share of the upkeep of the king and his courtiers.

Such a state of things cannot last, even in a monarchy, and on Thursday the people of this province will overthrow the man who has usurped the throne of the people and his courtiers will have to seek pastures new for an easy living. Louis saw nothing wrong in his actions as king of France, and Bowser sees no wrong in doing just as he pleases as king of British Columbia. Both were drunk with power, and the fate of Louis will be the fate of Bowser. There is no room for such a

king in British Columbia, nor in Canada today. The people must and shall rule.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Bowser party has reached the desperate stage where it has to depend on bluff and bluff alone. The last desperate effort to hold the outside vote is to spread the news that the soldiers' vote has gone heavily for the government. Letters from men in camps show that many hundreds who never voted Liberal before have done so on this occasion and that the proportion is tremendously against the government. Sam Hughes settled the soldiers' vote months ago.

Elected are reminded that on Thursday they are called upon to decide on Woman Suffrage. Every fair-minded man must admit that, had the ladies the vote, we would have cleaner and better government. In New Zealand, since the women were given the vote there has been much progressive legislation passed which would not have been on the statute books but for the ladies. Mothers and children can be best taken care of in the Legislature when the women have a voice in the governing of the country.

The fact that Sir Hibbert Tupper and thousands of genuine Conservatives are out to support H. G. Brewster and the Liberal government at this election is ample proof of the nature of the revolution which is raging in the hearts of the people.

The people, Conservative, Socialist, Labor, and Liberal, realize that this province cannot stand another term of Bowserism. It is now or never and every independent voter is out to make certain that Bowser will be defeated.




