WOMAN SUFFRAGE

To the Editor of The News,
Dear Sir:—Exactly twenty-three years ago this month, the government of New Zealand granted the franchise to all adult women. Immediately results began to appear. The franchise was used with such good effect that the succeeding government had a noticeably higher moral tone.
These men enacted laws that have made New Zealand a leader in humanitarian legislation. Among them were the old age pensions; Closer Settlement Act; Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration, etc. Nowhere in the world are women and children, old and infirm people so well protected as they are in New Zealand.

The improvement in the government is recognized in New Zealand as a result of the women's entry into politics. The government that the women of New Zealand are in a good measure responsible for has solved the most difficult land problems ever presented to any government. No doubt with women's franchise in this province there would be the same advance legislation. In New Zealand the franchise has resolved not into a question of sex at all, but one of intelligence.

Since the question of the franchise for women is up for decision here, it is to be hoped that the voters will not neglect the opportunity to place this province in the same progressive position as the countries where it has been found to work so satisfactorily.

We need all the intelligence and all the brain possible to help solve the problems of British Columbia today.
