#### THE DRYDOCK

The letter received by Mayor McCaffery from M. P. Cotton yesterday, in regard to the leasing of the drydock, throws a considerable amount of light on the subject, if it does not hold out much promise of an early starting of work at the plant.

Judging from the letter from Premier Borden to President Chamberlin, in which the premier stated that, after conferring with his colleagues, he had decided that, pending the investigation of the Railway Committee, it would be unwise to lease the plant at the present time, it is quite clear that Hon, Robert Rogers, in his wire to the mayor on Sept. 14th did not state the whole truth when he said that the whole matter was up to the Grand Trunk Pacific. It is apparent that the matter was very much up to the government and that! said government did not view the proposal with favor and that President Chamberlin had no alternative but to bow to the will of the premier and his ministers.




